The following extracts are taken from an address by Mr W. T. Stead, the noted English editor of Review of Reviews, in which he gives his ideas of a Christian's duty as a citizen of his country.

There are some of you, perhaps, who think that the churches have nothing to do with politics. God help you if that be your conviction, and may be speedily bringing you into a view more in accord with ordinary common sense.

The church should exert itself to bring Christians into everything, into the polling booth, into the Parliament House, into every department of human life, in fact. Every person who takes himself as a Christian man out of any department of human life into which it is possible for a Christian man to enter excludes himself from that department.

What is there to hinder the Church of Christ agreeing to come together on these three great principles: 1. That for place in a representative assembly no second-class need apply. 2. That it is wrong to give in newspapers and in politics. 3. That before a Christian elector goes to the polling-booth there should be laid upon his heart and conscience the truth—is voting, we are voting in the sight of God Almighty. If you are helping us hindering Christ Jesus, in voting, we are doing what we can to bring in the Kingdom of God here and mean times, if representatives of your churches, Catholic and Protestant, on the eve of an election, were to send their best men to meet together, and to matter how much they might differ even all other things, to endeavor to force that home upon politicians, could you not get better men to make better laws?
