**FIRE LIMITS BY-LAW**  
The City Council, at its meeting on  
Tuesday night, laid over an applica-  
tion to conduct a garage on Chapel  
Street until an investigation could  
be made as to the conditions obtain-  
ing in the other garages in town. The  
Council might also utilize the week  
in looking into the Fire Limits By-  
law. The bylaw we have in mind  
was passed several years ago, and  
was intended to secure within cer-  
tain limits new brick buildings, in-  
stead of patched-up wooden struc-  
tures. As is the case with most of  
the city bylaws, this piece of legisla-  
tion has been more honored in the  
breach than in the observance, but it  
seems to us that the Royal Bank has  
smashed a way of its own clean  
through the bylaw. If we remem-  
ber the bylaw correctly it set a limit  
to the extent of any alterations  
which could be made to the wooden  
building within the fire limits. The  
Vendome Block is certainly within  
the fire limits, and most assuredly  
it is to be judged by the alterations  
which are being made to the build-  
ing, then the existence of the bylaw  
has been entirely overlooked. At  
least this is our impression, and we  
are subject to correction, and the  
council will no doubt look into the  
matter.

**SIR DOUGLAS HAIG.**  
French military critics are un-  
stinted in their tributes to the skill  
of Sir Douglas Haig and his abor-  
dinate commanders and the fine or-  
ganization of the British army shown  
in the vast operation between the  
Scarpe and south of the Somme  
which began with their great drive  
towards Roy and Chateau. They  
speak enthusiastically of the perfect  
co-ordination of all the units, the  
precision with which each has taken  
on its share of the programme at a  
given time and thereby increasing  
the pressure upon the enemy's re-  
sources without treating a single un-  
tenable position for the advancing  
forces. One critic points out that  
the efficiency displayed by the British  
army is a crushing refutation of the  
old military axiom that it took  
five years to make a soldier, for, he  
says, the British advance was a ver-  
itable classic in the execution of a  
great military plan.

This is high praise, but it is wholly  
deserved. No leader in Britain's  
military annals has undergone a  
harder test than Sir Douglas Haig  
has had during the last year; none  
has had to meet so difficult a situa-  
tion or to bear so heavy a burden.  
The remarkable advance of the British  
army under its devoted leader, not  
only over the ground con-  
sidered to be overwhelming numbers  
a few months ago but beyond it in cer-  
tain vital sectors, must make an in-  
extinguishable appeal to the admiration  
of the world, while France with a  
more intimate understanding and  
concern shares in full measure the  
pride of the Empire in the achieve-  
ments of its splendid sons.
