### WAR FROM PEACE

In an article in the current number of the Atlantic Monthly, entitled "Peace, or War Everlasting?" the author, Hermann Keyserling, a Russian by birth, draws a rather gloomy picture of the social conditions throughout the world. He is fearful that we are entering an era of universal strife. He says: "The terms of the Peace of Versailles do not provide for what alone can be considered the final aim of the Great War. Therefore the war has not come to its real end yet. Nothing seems, nay is, more certain than that we are not emerging from, but rather entering into a period of universal strife." The writer then goes on to depict conditions as they exist, and comes to the conclusion that "as things now stand the world was never more pregnant with bloodshed and war than today."

The philosopher sees only such chaos as prevails in Russia if the International of Labor should gain control of the governments of the world; Capital, he believes, could not long withstand the attacks of public opinion; while the Church, he claims, is losing power of control. What little faith he has in the future he pins on the gentlemen of the world—using the term in its best sense. "True gentlemen," he maintains, "are not petty, nor rancorous, nor avaricious, but noble, fair and capable of self-sacrifice, of forgiving and forgetting. To what ever race or creed they belong, they realize and understand each other; they know how to live and let live; they see right and wrong objectively; they are superior to party exclusiveness, and full of sympathy for the legitimate claims of the disinherited."

Conditions may not be so hopeless as Keyserling sees them, but they are undoubtedly bad and little headway is being made in righting them. His suggested remedy—an international of gentlemen—will not appeal to many. For the reason that they will not try to understand what he means by the term "gentlemen," but there is not the slightest doubt that if the countries of the world were governed by gentlemen in place of

scheming politicians there would be fair dealing with all and social rest to replace social unrest.

### PREACHING SANS PRACTICE

The United States cannot have it both ways. If "self-determination," the "rights of small nations," and the "safety of democracy" mean anything, then the seizure of Tobago is a great national sin on the part of the United States. If, on the other hand, the United States finds that she must conduct her affairs must increase her possessions and then protect them, must make her sea lanes secure and mount big guns where they may be needed, just like every other great nation in the history of the world, then she has no right to criticize these other nations for their actions in protecting their own interests. Idealism and international practical politics do not always go well in double harness, and when there is a conflict between them it usually happens that people are more inclined to observe the stricter tenets of pure idealism. The trouble with certain people at Washington is that they are trying to apply to Europe an ethical code to which, in the pinch of circumstance they do not themselves wish to conform.

and woman of our community spread over the globe who valiantly took up the cudgels to bring about a peaceful and triumphant ending to such wholesale injustice and slaughter which our toes remorselessly worked out. We thank God for His help and guidance through it all, not by any means forgetting our Governor-General and his able Cabinet. And now the untold expense and aftermath of the big war tells heavily upon different countries (chiefly England), added to that, we must take up the work the soldiers and sailors left to our hands—surely and certainly they did—to carry on. Are we doing it? Are we living for others, and thereby perforce denying ourselves pleasure, ease, self-complacency, congratulating ourselves that having done our bit, peace is proclaimed, we may let go the reins and keep on indulging in the re-action of the war tension time?

But in France today, in Belgium, and Armenia come appealing, heart-rending appeals for help, clothing, food, all necessities. A missionary, living in Armenia, urged Americans to send large supplies at once to the thousands of miserable suffering Armenians, just lately. Things are bad in parts of Belgium and France too.

I suppose the prevalent epidemic of sickness in Central Europe must be due to these causes. There seems to be need for further effort on our part, if possible. What conditions of health prevail in the far East and Central Europe, may reach us here by many channels in these days.

As to our own people. Men have brotherhoods everywhere, one man caring for and helping one particular boy or young man. Have women Sisterhoods, each woman caring for and helping one distinct girl? Canada must have men and women of sound health and morals; of stout, firm stamina and fibre, on prairie, and in forest, city and village homes. How else can we neighbor and help the endless stream of people coming to our land from all parts? We all know the necessity of Canadianizing these.

Are we falling in line with the Forward Movement, the Great Blessed, United National Campaign, springing directly out of the war, or leaving it to the Ministers and Churches to pull along as best they can alone? We united to a unit in the past war, why not unite still in a good and necessary work? If not, where will we stand when the records are opened and read before a multitude that no man can number, as we take our places up yonder, with all who have gone before? It is surely coming!

As to prohibition from meats, drink, dress, pleasure, indifference, carelessness, or what not is wrong in each life, let us think in all fairness in plain blunt common sense, if our men and women, during the war, gave their all, their homes, friends, prospects and life itself for US and our future safety—to live on and on in peace and joy—mind you, after THEY (dear ones) are dead, on earth, can we not, will we not in God's name give up something dear and precious to us, be it what it may, if it will benefit, help or save others? It seems to me we cannot evade that question. Put a glass of ale or wine in your one hand and a soldier's all—his life in the other one, which weighs the heavier—Friends, isn't this right and true, logical reasoning? If we will face it? What is play, fun, or life to one, may be death to another, we are all so differently constituted. But undoubtedly from the time of Cain and Abel to the present the truth holds good, we are our brother's keeper—and no man liveth to himself alone but we influence others also.

The urgent times we live in, and the days ahead of us, demand plain speech. I leave it with you. One who loves and delights in Canada and also in her people as a whole.

## THE EMPIRE NEEDS NEW MACHINERY

General Smuts Declares That New Remedies Must Be Found to Fit New Conditions.

London, June 3.—(Can. Press.) The Daily Chronicle publishes a special interview with General Smuts at Cape Town in which he reiterated that the war had transformed the Dominions into "sister states."

"Unfortunately the old machinery still remains," added the general, "and it is astonishing that the statesmen have not yet realized the anachronism. I have insisted on a constitutional change in the Empire and I am also astonished that others have not been equally impressed with its inevitability. The British people must realize this great constitutional fact, that there must be a complete equality and freedom enjoyed by the sister States and united by the King. Your constitutional problem is to find new formulas to fit new conditions."

General Smuts in the course of this interview apparently made no statement concerning the present domestic and political situation in South Africa.
