

# A FOUL MURDER.

A Fifteen Year Old Boy Shot Dead at Hantsport, Nova Scotia,

Because He Threw a Turnip at the Fence of a Farmer of That Place.

## MURDERER CONFESSES HIS GUILT.

HANTSPORT, N. S., Nov. 2.—On Saturday evening in this town the penalty of death was visited upon Percy Corkum, a 15-year-old youth, for the simple offence of throwing a turnip at the fence near the residence of True-man Trefy, who admits having taken deliberate aim at the boy and with a muzzle-loading gun filled to its fullest capacity, shot the boy dead. After the shooting Trefy made a statement that he had loaded the gun himself and had awaited the appearance of three boys who had previously passed the house, one of whom had thrown a turnip which had struck the window sill. These boys were Percy Corkum, Harry Wood Zwickler and Harry Kelly. Trefy did not have to wait long for the boys. When he noticed them returning he crouched behind his fence and almost

immediately after young Corkum had thrown a turnip True-man fired the shot. The heart and lungs of the boy were literally perforated. While the remains were lying in a pool of blood on the roadside Trefy remarked: "Yes, I fixed him: I had been bothered long enough and this fellow will tantalize me no more." He coolly picked the body up from the centre of the road and laid it on the edge to prevent teams from running over it. Shortly after the shooting Trefy found Dr. Margeson. He told him that he had shot a man and desired the physician to accompany him to his home. Trefy then repaired to the magistrate and surrendered himself. The magistrate told Trefy to go home, but later a warrant was sworn out and Trefy was arrested.

## DREARY LABRADOR.

Anxiety Felt at Fate of American Explorer in the Northern Wilds.

ST. JOHNS, Nfld., Nov. 3.—Jas. Calder, a lumberman from Rigolet, Labrador, the last white man to see Leclaire Hubbard, Jr., of New York, assistant editor of Outing and head of the Labrador exploring expedition, has arrived here in the mail boat Virginius Lake. Calder expresses grave doubts as to the safety of the Hubbard party, which was attempting what he considers an impossible trip. Calder tried to dissuade Mr. Hubbard from venturing inland, but he persisted, and as already told in these despatches, he gave away nearly all his food before starting on the plea that he could advance quicker if the burden was light. His intention was to proceed north towards Ungava Bay, but if he found this impossible, his alternative would be to travel to the southwest, hoping to break out in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. It was the purpose of Mr. Hubbard to exist on what he killed with the rifle, but Calder, who previously had travelled 150 miles inland through the forest, advised his taking a shot gun. Calder believes that the only chance for Mr. Hubbard and his two companions is that a party of Neascopoc Indians, following the same route some six weeks later on a trapping expedition, may come up with him.

## THE AYLESWORTH BANQUET.

The Canadian Commissioner on Alaska Tribunal Says That

Lord Alverstone Sided (With Canada at First

But Changed His Mind and Favored the Americans.

TORONTO, Nov. 2.—A banquet tendered to A. B. Aylesworth, K. C., one of the Alaska commissioners, by the Canadian Club at the King Edward tonight, was a splendid tribute to his sturdy Canadianism.

Mr. Aylesworth's speech, which lasted over an hour, was a very careful review of the decision arrived at by the tribunal along lines laid down by himself and Sir Louis Jette in dissenting judgment, but he evidently spoke throughout under considerable restraint.

The whole address was apparently calculated to soothe some of the feelings of resentment which has arisen.

He repeats, however, that the three British commissioners had first agreed with the Canadian contention with regard to the four islands in Portland Canal was unanswerable and that the Canadian commissioners did not know until Saturday before the decision was given that their colleague had changed his mind. In giving two of those islands to the United States the commission had divided property in dispute instead of acting judicially.

In this connection he held Vancouver's narrative meant that all four islands should belong to either one of the parties. He paid a high tribute to the ability of Sir Louis Jette and to the loyalty of the people of Canada.

In closing Mr. Aylesworth said he had heard during the past few weeks from more than one quarter that nothing of controversial character should appear in their pronouncement and that after the tribunal had spoken officially nothing more should follow. He could only answer by saying that from first to last he felt he had a duty to the people of Canada first. "We in Canada have been fighting the battles of Great Britain in the northwestern part of the British empire for years and if that feeling could have been more appreciated in all parts of the empire the meeting of the Canadian Club tonight might have been of a different aspect."

## COERCING CHINA.

The Pretences Put Forward by China for Latest Aggression.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—In a despatch from Peking, the correspondent there of the Times, says he doubts the reports of a large Chinese army in the vicinity of Mukden, because the principal grievance of the Tartar general has been that Russia restricted him to 7000 troops for the entire province.

Nobody in Peking believes, the correspondent continues, that China will make any further resistance than a verbal protest.

LOUIS, Mo., Nov. 3.—While running at a high rate of speed an inbound Wabash fast freight train crashed into a freight ahead in a dense fog yesterday, fifty miles west of here, injuring seven men, two of whom may die, and killing seven carloads of stock. The cabooses of the train ahead was split open and seven stock men were hurled through the debris.

Roadmaster McKay has had a new plank properly put in position at the upper side of the crossing at the intersection of Queen and Carleton streets.

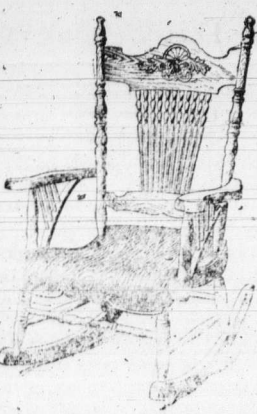


