The Conscription Vote

That the Government's measure for compulsory military service would pass its second reading in the House of Commons was expected, and the majority of sixty-three is just about what was predicted as the probable figure After the first half dozen out standing Liberals had announce their intention of voting for aid to the boys in the trenches preference to supporting the sen seless referendum proposal of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Quebec friends, any doubt as to the fate

of the bill disappeared. In Friday's voting Quebec alone furnished a majority for the provinces they secured but ten votes, which, with Quebec's fortyfive, gave them their total. New Brunswick came next in opposition to the measure, three Liberal members from that province casting their votes for Laurier. Ontario and Nova Scotia each gave two votes, while the western provinces, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Colum bia gave but two in all. In other words, west of the Great Lakes the Laurier referendum found but two supporters. The Government measure found

its greatest support in Ontario where sixty-eight votes were cast for it. The West went very strongly conscription, Saskatchewan, British Columbia and the Yukon lining up solidly. Of thirteen votes cast by repre sentatives from Manitoba and Alberta, eleven were for conscription.
