A Curious Contrast.

The state of affairs in Tripoli to day appears to afford a curious contrast to what took place some thirty years ago in Egypt. Egypt and Tripoli are the two Turkish possessions in Africa. They adjoin and both bor der the Mediterranean Sea. In the early eighties Britain determined t intervene in Egypt. Admiral Seymour bombarded Alexandria. Lord Beresford bounded into fame by his daring, and the signal "Well done, Condor," is remembered to Beresford's credit to-day. The forts at Alexandria were destroyed and Arabi Pasha smashed at Tel el Keber by Lord Wolsley. In this manner was begun the British occupation of th Turkish possession, Egypt, and har lasted some thirty years. The demo lition of forts, the crushing of a army, with the attendant bloodshed of the combatants and the resultan occupation of the territory did no constitute war. At least so the Brit ish Premier, Mr. Gladstone, th Grand Old Man of those days, assured the House of Commons while these naval and military manoeuvres were going on, in his famous declaration

that a state of war did not exist What a remarkable contrast is forded by the intervention of Italy in Tripoli, the other Turkish possession in Africa. War was declared by Italy on Friday afternoon, and to the time of writing we have heard of no bombardment, no landing of troops, no battles, no bloodshed, and it is said that Turkey will offer no forcible resistance to the occupation of Tripoli by Italy, and yet a state of war does exist, while thirty years ago, under the circumstances we have related it did not exist in Egypt. Truly war af fords strange contrasts. Sometime we have all the violence of war with out the state of war; sometimes we have an act of violence. like the sinking of Russian warships by the Japanese, preceding any formal declaration of war, and now we have a declaration followed by a war in an apparent state of suspended animation. Of course there i for this remarkable state of affairs, if we can only find and about it we venture to offer a suggestion. Italy has command of the sea. Turkey cannot strike Italy. Italy desires political and commercial predominance in Tripoli, just as Britain has it in Egypt, under the suzerainty of Turkey, but she wants to gain it if possible by a landless war, and she has settled her plan of campaign to attain this end. Cutting short diplomatic negotiations, she declared war so that she could prevent Turkey landing any army corps to defend Tripoli, which is now at her mercy, and will remain at her mercy so long as she retains command of the sea,
