**Notes and Comments.**

It would appear that something in the nature of a European boycott is developing in regard to the Panama Exhibition. Press dispatches state that Britain will take no part in it. That Russia is following Britain, and that Germany may follow suit. In spite of these declarations, we remain sceptical. It is said that the boycott is due to the Panama dispute. We cannot believe that the leading European nations will act in this manner if the States agree to a full submission of the whole dispute to arbitration. If, on the contrary, America should decline to do so, as was urged by some of the leading politicians in the heat of the last Presidential campaign, the European Powers would be quite justified in doing so. Those Powers would not be overstepping the bounds of international comity, should they decline to take any steps towards taking part in any celebration until the States have agreed clearly and definitely to a frank and full reference to the Hague Tribunal or some such international tribunal. As soon, however, as the reference has been agreed upon and the terms of the submission settled, there would appear to us no good ground for a boycott. At the first blush it appeared that the action of the States in regard to Canal tolls was a wilful tearing up of a treaty in order to gain a natural advantage. If a treaty is to be denounced by America immediately it becomes disadvantageous to them, it is no use making a treaty with America. No nation can admit the propriety of America holding to a treaty so long as it is advantageous to them and denouncing it immediately it becomes disadvantageous to them.

teague. The rights are mutual and the obligations are mutual. But a dispute as to interpretation may arise in good faith, and when such a dispute arises the only course is to settle it by a reference to a proper tribunal. Unwillingness to do so and tardiness in doing so destroy credibility in the honesty of purpose of the offender and may justly be visited by conduct which expresses appropriately the displeasure of the offended party. Britain cannot with honour take part in the Panama Exhibition if the States continue to treat her dishonourably. Nor can other nations similarly treated. If however the States show bona fides by a prompt and unequivocal agreement to refer the whole dispute for impartial settlement, a boycott of the Exhibition would be childish. For after all the cutting of the Panama Canal is one of the wonders of the age with extraordinary potentialities for the future and is well worthy of international celebration.

**Lunatic at Large.**

An inmate of the Lunatic Asylum, named Reeves, of White Bay, escaped from the grounds of the institution about 5 p.m. yesterday. He was at work in a cut and slipped clear of the keepers and ran for the Topsail Road. The police were notified and had men after him last night, but did not succeed in catching him.

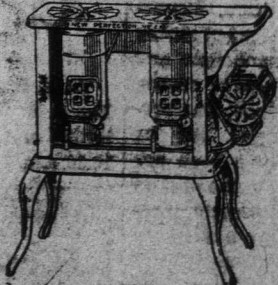

**Cable News.**

LONDON, To-Day.

The allies in their demands presented to the Peace Conference, proposed the establishment of a frontier, starting east from Struma River and running midway through Rumania, reaching the Aegean Sea sixteen miles west of Dedeagatch. This would leave Bulgaria with a coast line in the Aegean Sea of less than thirty miles. If these drastic terms are accepted Bulgaria will lose from the two wars a little larger than when she entered into them, but she will have to abandon a large amount of territory to Rumania. In addition the allies maintain their demand for an indemnity. It is probable the negotiations will be protracted and an armistice of five days will be renewed. No objection is likely to be raised to its renewal, for it is seen that both the Serbians and Greeks fought themselves to a standstill. A despatch to the Telegraph from Belgrade asserts the casualties in the Serbian army in the past month's fighting aggregate nearly 35,000.

SHANGHAI, To-day.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, one of the leaders of the Southern rebellion, declared the occupation of the city of Nanking by the Government force is temporary. The spirit of the Southerners, he announced, is undaunted. They hope to renew the struggle when arrangements with Kwang Tung and other Southern Provinces have been completed. Dr. Sun Yat Sen leaves Shanghai to-night for Hong Kong, where personally he will make an appeal for further support in his campaign to overthrow Provisional President Yuan Shi Kai for crimes which the Southern leader claims have been committed by President, namely—illegal execution of Military officers, assassination of the Nationalist leader General Sheng Chiao Jen, issuing unconstitutional mandates, exacting laws without consulting parliament.

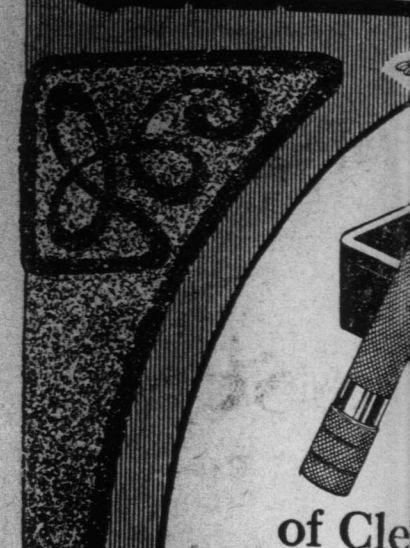
**The Boy Who Meant To.**

But in a new book lost himself and read till dawn came light.

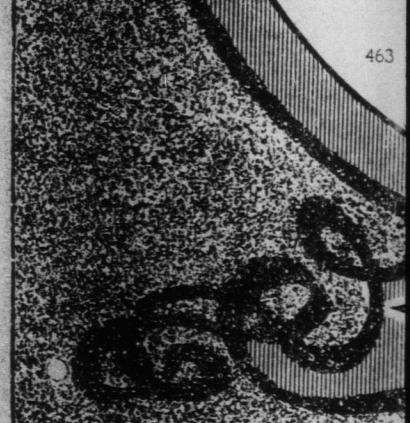
At school, he meant to lead his class before the term was done.
