### Extension of Parliament.

We are not concerned with the fulminations of Mr. Coaker, et al., when in opposition, as to what they intended to do and would do, if then Government attempted to extend its life. Everyone knows what they did and most of us know that all the big talk and the skyrocketing eloquence was merely hot air. All the while the F. P. U. members in the Assembly were opposing the contemplated measure with horns and hoofs, their Chief was engaged in a disgraceful dicker with the enemy, which ended in the formation of the National (?) Government, and with the sweets of office sticking to their lips, a deep silence fell. It is on record that a resolution was passed by the Carbonate District Council, some little time prior to the coalition in which it was unanimously agreed that "No Amalgamation" was possible, but the ink of that historic document was scarcely dry ere it was treated as a "scrap of paper" and its provisions conveniently forgotten. But that is in the dead past. To-day more concern attaches to the new legislation which is to be brought in for a further prolongation of the already extended term of the General Assembly, and the second reading of a Bill for which, went through the House yesterday, and which apparently will be railroaded through Committee and into the third reading and passed by sheer brute majority.

The attention and notice of the Governor has been directed to this act of legislative brigandage, but if it is correct, as asserted, and not contradicted, that this is the price which His Excellency has agreed to pay for the passage of a Selective Conscription measure, no hope can be entertained of a veto from that quarter.

It is rather significant of the above that the "Act respecting Military Service" is in close juxtaposition to the order paper to "An Act to further extend the term of Parliament." Straws sometimes show how the wind blows and if we mistake not the direction of the breeze is decidedly favorable, blowing as it does from Government House. Notwithstanding the vice-regal favor toward the proposed extension, it will be a surprise if a tempest does not arise against it in the Upper House, and a tempest strong enough to make a derelict out of the new ship which the Government has ready for sea. The whole country relies upon the gentlemen in the Legislative Council to stand firm and defeat this most iniquitous and illegal measure. It is beyond expectation that any of the newly made Councilors will vote in the negative. Nevertheless there is sufficient strength in evidence to make the passage of the Bill impossible. Newfoundland expects every man to do his duty!

The Herald yesterday had a long dismal, gloomy leading article, showing the perils in the path if the lease of life was not given to Parliament, and as is customary trots out the usual Canadian precedent to buttress its position.

As we have before pointed out such precedents do not hold good in our case, and it is but idle to quote them. That disaster will result from an elec-

tion in the fall is too laughable, and we wonder that the Herald advances it. The constitutional aspect is altogether ignored, and a lot of scare argument, too childish and silly to repeat, are made use of. It is common knowledge that, confronted with the exigencies which the Herald mentions, the present administration would have no more idea of grappling with them, than an infant. Their past attempts were ludicrous and ridiculous, as witness some of the instructions issued to Customs officials with regard to shipping, many of which smack of the kindergarten. Should German submarines of huge build or enemy warships be large in the Atlantic during the summer months, how in the name of high Heaven will an extension of the life of Parliament prevent it, or what steps will our naval and military experts take to protect our shores and commerce, in this extremity?

### To the "Advocate."

In answer to the charge made by the Advocate yesterday that the Telegram "having favored the policy of the Government in bringing forward a Military Service Act, is now insidiously working against it," we might observe that it is due to the Telegram that the Government found the courage to bring in this measure. Had the Telegram NOT announced its support of Selective Conscription on the day following the "cold" reception given the Premier and Minister of Militia at the Casino, we doubt if the Bill would have been introduced in the Assembly. With regard to the Selective Draft Act, we have no politics and as announced on Wednesday, we have pledged our support to the measure, our only reservation being that it be not swaddled in unacceptable conditions. Yesterday we stated that "no matter what opposition the Bill meets with in certain quarters, it must go through." We do object, however, to the pernicious agreement which it is alleged has been made by the Governor and the Government for a quid pro quo, and in combatting this shall go as far as we think fit. It is useless for the Government to attempt to claim any credit for the introduction of the Military Service Act. They were forced to do it by the sentiment which developed, following the proclamation of the Telegram's attitude. Neither can the Government claim credit for the Soldiers' movement, which has brought more men to the colors in three weeks than the recruiting system of the Minister of Militia produced in six months.

It is something unusual to now witness the Coaker organ taking the centre of the stage and making its little spiel by command, in favor of a Conscription Act, to which it, by common consent, was so strenuously OPPOSED ONLY A SHORT TIME AGO - Tempora Mutantur.
