## First Day of Drive Most Satisfactory.

### \$48,493.20 Reported.

The College Hall was the scene of a most enthusiastic gathering last night, when the teams in connection with the Maternity Hospital drive reported for the first time. Much energy had been displayed during the day, and the meeting at night was a fitting climax to a most successful day's canvass. The fund now reaches the magnificent amount of over \$48,000. Splendid! everyone will say, and so it is. But there is still a long way to go. Over fifty thousand dollars are still needed before the objective is attained. There is still much ground to be covered, but if citizens respond as generously during the balance of the week there is no doubt of the results. The teams are composed of our most zealous workers, who will leave no stone unturned to make the victory a glorious one by going over the top. Hon. M. G. Winter presided at the banquet last night, and proceedings went with a swing. The singing was most impressive. The ragtime and darkey melodies were taken up by all the guests, and was a feature of the evening. The chairman was very happy in his announcements. The initial gifts, which on Friday totalled over thirty thousand dollars, now amounted to nearly \$41,000. The announcement of the large gifts were received with applause. Mr. Dunbar, who is a very pleasing speaker, was in a very happy mood, and he had just cause to be. He complimented the teams on their splendid results, and felt confident they will reach the needed sum.

The Salvation Army has established the largest chain of hospitals of this kind in the world. Nearly 50 such institutions are operated by the Army throughout Canada and the United States. Many thousands of mothers and children pass through these hospitals each year. Ottawa, London, Windsor and Halifax alone, have contributed \$600,000 for similar hospitals. Halifax has just laid the corner stone of its \$125,000 building.

The whole country will benefit by this institution, and Mr. Dunbar felt sure no one would refuse to help along such a worthy cause. A large number of names have not yet been touched. The Refusal Box will be open to-day. This will contain the names of those who have said they will not contribute, but many no doubt will do so when asked the second time. The Committee will get in touch with the outposts by telegram, and amounts received from these sources will be credited to the teams handling in the names. The "hidden names," those living in hotels or boarding houses, bank officials or transient visitors to the city, will also be taken care of. The employees' subscriptions will, it is hoped, swell the amount. The committee in charge of that part of the work has covered much ground and anticipate good results. Mr. F. Bradshaw is the chairman of that committee. Interest is great and the excitement keen. The pennant winners, "we are it" will have to look to their laurels to-day, as the others intend making a bidding for the bunting. The reports last night were as follows:

## Successful Newfoundlanders.

Miss Lizzie Cowan, daughter of our respected townsman, Mr. Robert A. Cowan, cooper, Brazil's Square, arrived by the S.S. Rosalind after spending a pleasant and extended visit to the United States and Canada. While in Montreal she spent a considerable time with her brothers, Samuel and John, who, like so many of our countrymen, are making good—the former holding the responsible and remunerative position of Cashier in the office of the Canada Sugar Refinery, and the latter foreman cooper on the docks of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. The younger brother, James, has been residing for some years at Cowan Station, Little Lake, California, U.S.A., and is the most prominent citizen in that neighborhood, as is fully evident by the Station being called after him. It is

estimated 5000 feet above sea level, and the proprietor of the Station, Mr. Cowan, is always provided with competent guides, automobiles, and other vehicles for the benefit of the many tourists who visit the Station on hunting and fishing excursions. Judging from what we have read of Cowan Station, in the near future it will become a most prosperous and populous locality, and the enterprising young settler will undoubtedly rise with the future town, as so many of our countrymen have already done in the United States and Canada. The brothers Cowan are three eminently clever and well-educated young men, having studied under the Christian Brothers in this city. Samuel has been 28 years working in Canada, John about thirteen years settled in Montreal and James several years in the far West. 


