

It is manifestly unfair to the producer of good eggs, that his neighbor, who is careless and has some bad eggs, should receive the same price as the careful producer. Eggs which cannot be legally bought or sold in Saskatchewan include Addled eggs, Moldy eggs, Black rots, White rots, and partially incubated

An article on system of marketing, and one on cost of production will conclude articles as far as market eggs are concerned, as enough on producing, grading, and candling has been given to start an upward trend in the quality if those interested take hold properly. Market poultry will be touched on briefly, and then Soil, Housing, Breeding, Incubation and Brooding etc., etc. will be dealt with in rotation and always with the idea of helping the beginner in view.
