TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

BILL ABANDONED.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 4. Senate Republicans, meeting in party caucus late Saturday night, decided to abandon the Dyer anti-lynching bill, against which Democrats waged a four day's continuous filibuster.

SIX DAY BIKE RACE.

NEW YORK, Dec. 4. Sixteen teams of riders started after midnight this morning on the thirty-third six day bicycle race over Madison Square Garden track, with Walter Rutt of the German team leading on the first mile.

SEVERE PENALTIES.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 4. Orders have been issued by Kemalists forbidding all employees of Government indulging in alcoholic drinks on pain of dismissal and the infliction of thirty lashes. Policemen and soldiers found drinking will be discharged.

WHO WANTS AN HOUR?

CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 4. Rafet Pasha is trying to find husbands for one hundred and fifty former inmates of the Sultan's harem. The women range from seventeen to thirty-five, all of them being penniless. A numerous progeny, also 20 Princes and Princesses of Royal blood, with hundreds of servants are a problem, and the Government has decided to make them shift for themselves.

A RUSSIAN PROTEST.

LAUSANNE, Dec. 4. George T. Chitcherlin, Russian Foreign Minister, late last night sent a note to the President of the Near East Conference, protesting against the decision of the Conference to bar Russians from all meetings, except those dealing with the Dardanelles. He declared Russia and her Allies

would not abide by any decisions taken in their absence, and disclaimed responsibility for the abnormal state of affairs that would follow.

COAL STRIKE IN ALBERTA.

CALGARY, Dec. 4. More than fifty per cent. of the miners in Edmonton coalfields have responded to a strike call, issued Friday by officials of District eighteen, United Mine Workers of America.

A TICKLISH SITUATION.

LAUSANNE, Dec. 4. Delegates to the Near East Conference approached today's session with the conviction that a critical moment of the discussion is now at hand. The greatest problem of to-day, the Dardanelles is vitally interesting all the powers and Russian delegates will make their appearance for the first time. There is uneasiness abroad among other delegates over closed consultations being carried on among Russian and Turkish groups at Lausanne, who have come to the Conference in the guise of Allies. The Turks want Straits for Turkish warships alone, while Europe and United States want them open to naval craft of all the world as provided in the Sevres treaty.

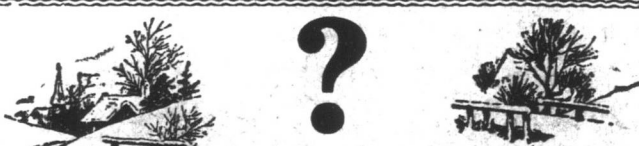
