Adventuring in the Antarctic

MEMORIES OF AN EXPLORER WHO WENT SOUTH WITH SCOTT

Chief Petty-Officer WIL LIAMSON.

(The Lock-keeper at Shepperton.)

... a lock in one of the quiet parts of the Thames is a great change from the sort of thing I am accustomed to! But let me tell you the story.

I don't remember anything about my parents. My earliest recollections are of kicks and blows, with my body cramped and starved, and my home the walls of a tumble-down attic. When I was ten years old I ran away to sea and found I had fallen out of the rigging and into the fire. Not only was I treated just as badly as before, but I was in the risk of getting drowned in the bargain!

However, I got through it, and eventually joined the Navy. Here I met my only real friend I ever had in my life—the late Captain Scott. He was very kind to me, right down from the beginning, and when he asked for volunteers for his expedition to the South Pole, in 1901, I was one of the first to sign up and was lucky enough to be accepted.

I served through that expedition, and also through the later one that was set in 1910, during which Captain Scott met his death. In fact, I was a member of the party that found the body of Captain Scott and his companions, and it was the most terrible shock I ever had.

One of my most treasured possessions to-day is a leather thong which was used to repair the sledges in case of need, but it's worth more to me than gold.

Another thing I value greatly is the Edward's Silver Antarctic Medal. The ribbon is pure white, and naturally don't see many of them about. There are only three other men living besides myself who have a medal with two bars—that is, one each expedition—in which we have been part.

My little house by the lock is decorated with many relics of those expeditions. To save cargo space on my journeys the crew have to make as many as possible of the things they want when they get somewhere near the Pole.

One coat, overalls, and such things are fashioned from the skins of seals which are caught and killed. The ribs and skins are made from wood on the ship, and so on. When the expedition returns to civilization the members of the crew are allowed to keep many of these things, and when they made them, they are valued accordingly.

By the way, it's impossible to shave on a Polar expedition, as, of course, the water would freeze on your face for the same reason you can't wash when you settle down late, winter waters. Each man takes a turn at popping up at night to guard the camp, look to the fire, and do such things.

It is a duty that is always looked forward to, because it is both night and day have the place to yourself, and while your comrades are asleep, you get as much water as you want, melting down the snow to obtain it, and have a glorious scrub!

The narrowest escape that I ever had happened during the war. I was in a torpedo-boat when it struck a mine and went where I was standing. There were eleven men with me and they were all killed. I was thrown into the sea with my ribs broken, and floated about for an hour before I was picked up and nursed back to health.

Papyrus

Papyrus was manufactured by the ancient Egyptians by taking a sheet of bark from a tree which it seems to grow only in Egypt, and laying it flat on a board, and then laying a cross over it, the materials having been previously moistened with water, made slightly glutinous. The sheet thus formed was pressed and dried in the sun. The placing of two layers of bark in this manner across each other was intended to strengthen the texture of the sheet, for the fibers, it was found, were very easily separated and torn so long as they lay wholly in the direction. The sheet, when dry, was finished by smoothing the surface, and prepared to receive inscriptions made by means of a pen fashioned from a reed or a quill.

The rolls of paper and parchment were only used for important writings which it was intended permanently to preserve. For ordinary occasions tablets of wax and other similar materials were used, upon which the writer traced the characters with the point of a stylus instrument. The head of this instrument was smooth and rounded, so that any words which the writer wished to erase might be obliterated by smoothing over again, with it, the wax on which they had been written.
