Newfoundlander Aids American Youth to Escape Hanging

SIR WILLIAM GOODE INTER-
VENED TO PREVENT ENDAN-
GERING NEW LOAN.

Budapest, April 25.—John Bartles, an American, has just had a narrow escape from being hanged in Hungary for refusing to do compulsory military service. He was saved by Sir William Goode, noted financier of Great Britain and Newfoundland.

The Peace Treaty forbids compulsory military service in Hungary, but in the country districts of the nation all boys are now being forced to undergo military training, and the Inter-Allied Military Control Commission knows of at least 100 cases where boys who have complained against this service have been secretly court-martialed for high treason and hanged. These were mostly Jewish boys.

The Hungarian authorities must use compulsion to force boys in their volunteer army, which the treaty limits to 35,000, because it is impossible to get enough boys to sign up for twelve years at two cents daily.

Young Bartles, who has just come of age, was born in Johnstown, Pa. of Hungarian parents who returned to Hungary a few years ago. Although an American citizen on account of his birth in America he was notified to start his compulsory task. He was threatened with a court martial and hanging if he refused to obey the orders.

The boy came secretly to Budapest where he called on Judge Theodore Brentano, the American minister. The latter asked Washington to issue an immediate passport and he also notified the Hungarian authorities that he would hold them responsible if any harm came to the lad. If Bartles' life had been seriously jeopardized, Judge Brentano intended to bring him to the American Legation and defy the Hungarian Government to touch him there.

The Hungarian government refused for several days to release Bartles and then Sir William Goode, financial adviser who is arranging a \$50,000,000 Hungarian re-construction loan, intervened and forced his release to prevent the forfeiture of the loan in America from being endangered.—Montreal Daily Star.

Factory for New Freezing Process

Carbon-Dioxide Plant to be Built
By Frost Air Corporation.

MONTREAL, April 25.—As a result of the success of the experiment carried out the other day with carbon-dioxide gas, a new process for refrigeration, under the auspices of the Federal Government in conjunction with the Frost Air Corporation of New York City, was tested in Montreal yesterday afternoon from New York that the corporation is taking steps for the erection of a plant in Montreal, which will constitute the first of a chain which it is intended to build across the whole of the Dominion.

It is anticipated that this new form of ice will revolutionize the present refrigeration system not only for refrigerator cars but for the transportation of fish, fruit, yeast and other perishable commodities. The Frost Air Corporation will also place on the market many other important devices which have been perfected in which the new gas is used for domestic and commercial purposes.

The car load of fish which was carried from Halifax to Montreal and delayed in opening for nearly three days in Montreal, and then opened by Federal Government officials and important and influential representatives of the fish industry proved to be sound and in a perfect condition as if the fish had just been taken out of the water.

First of Chain.

Walter S. Josephson, the vice-president and general manager, stated then in an interview that it was the intention of the Canadian Frost Air Corporation to erect manufacturing plants in various parts of the Dominion for the purpose of commercializing carbon-dioxide gas for refrigeration. The decision to erect the first plant in Montreal will be welcomed. At the moment the site has not yet been determined, but it is expected that a decision will be arrived at as soon as the officials of the company return from New York, which will probably be at the end of this week.

Scholarship for Farmers' Sons

LONDON, (A.P.)—The ministry of agriculture has formulated a scheme for awarding scholarships and maintenance grants for sons and daughters of agricultural workmen. These young people will be able to go straight from the plough or farm to a university which has a department of agriculture.

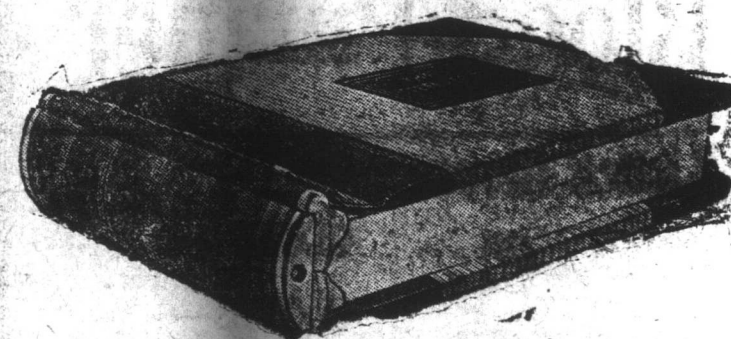
