90,000 SAW GIBBONS WIN BY KNOCKOUT.

LONDON, Aug. 11 .- Tommy Gipions, American light-heavyweight, knocked out Jack Bloomfield, British heavyweight champion, in the third round of an international contest. Saturday afternoon, in the Wembley stadium, Nearly 90,000 spectators saw the one-sided bout.

The fighters were slow in entering the ring, and the vast crowd became impatient at the delay. There was a big cheer when Referee Eugene Corri called them to the centre of the ring for the final instructions.

Gibbons rushed from his corner at the bell and tore fiercely into the Englishman. He apparently went out to make a short fight of it.

Englishman Is Cantions. Bloomfield was cautious and retreated before the advances of the American, sticking out a left to keep Gibbons from getting close. Bloomfield improved toward the end of the first round, but Gibbons had the advantage clearly.

Gibbons dashed again from his corner at the start of the second round and carried a savage attack to the Englishman. He landed a hard left and Bloomfield went down for the count of seven. Another right to the iaw sent him to the floor for the count of nine and he came up groggy.
