NEW BRUNSWICK MAY PUT UP THE BARRIER

Will Likely Follow the Example of Quebec on Its Pulpwood Policy

Washington, April 30.—It seems altogether probable that the province of New Brunswick will follow the lead of Quebec in prohibiting the exportation of pulpwood. A telegram has been received at the state department from United States Consul Moorehead at St. John, N. B., stating that the provincial parliament had passed a resolution prohibiting the manufacture of pulpwood within the province and has appointed a committee to investigate and report at the meeting of the parliament in February next.

This action is assumed to mean that New Brunswick desires to manufacture her own wood pulp rather than to permit the exportation of the wood for manufacture in the United States. If such a law is passed it will further complicate the wood pulp situation and is likely to have a tendency to increase the price of print paper in the United States.

ONTARIO APPLES BROUGHT HERE IN COLD STORAGE

A Very Successful Experiment Made by the Department of Agriculture

The first experiment in shipping Ontario apples in cold storage from Ontario to Western Canada was made last week and was so successful that it will be continued. A car load of

apples were despatched from cold storage in London, by J. S. Riddock, cold storage commissioner, to M. P. McNellie of Calgary, fruit inspector of this city. The apples were in cold storage until they reached Calgary, and arrived in practically perfect condition. The car load was quickly sold to a local grocery, and are being retailed rapidly throughout the city.
