Duke Sorry He Can't Be Here

The Duke of Connaught will not attend the boxing bout for the championship of the Dominion on September 4, because of his inability to be in Calgary on that day. The itinerary for the royal tour was arranged before the invitation to attend the big battle was received by the governor-general. The following letter was received yesterday in answer to the invitation sent to the duke last week:

Sir: His Royal Highness, the governor-general, desires me to thank you for the invitation which you were good enough to send him for the boxing championship of Canada, and wishes me to express his regret that as he will not be in Calgary on that date, he will not be able to attend.
