Not Regard It as a Crists. Hon. J. R. Stratton, sworn, testi-fied, that, though the last election was closely contested, he did not re-gard it as a crisis. In the previous election the members were 46 Liber-als, 45 Conservatives, 2 not heard from, and 1 election not held. But the Government was sustained. 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
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The Gamey Interview.





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
