LOAN DRIVE STARTS MONDAY

Money Will All Be Spent in Canada and Will Ensure Prosperity in the Futuse

Canada's big drive for \$300,000 .-000 that will enable her to pay her war bill and carry the country safely through the reconstruction period with no cessation of the present prosperity will commence Monday.

On that day canvassers throughout the Dominion, from the Atlantic to the Pacific and as far north as Hudson's Bay and the Yukon, will start their rounds of the homes of Canada. It will be the duty of all Canadians who have the welfare of their country at heart to greet them cordially. The campaign will last three weeks. If you are not visited by one of the army of canyassers you will be able to make your investment at any healt. your investment at any bank.

The denominations of the bonds are \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1,000, in two maturities, 5 and 15 years, at 5½ per cent. interest, payable half-yearly on May 1 and Nov. 1. Subscriptions may be paid in full at time of application, or extended over five months.

All the money raised will be spent in Canada. The proceeds will be used to pay the indebtedness of the war and to meet the expenditures to be made in connection with de-mobilization and the re-establishment of our soldiers in civil life. Other expenditures include the national shipbuilding and railway construction and other national un-dertakings, and the establishment of credits abroad so that we may dispose of our huge surplus of foodstuffs, timber, manufactured articles and other products. The need for the money is urgent, and in subscribing the citizen will not only be doing Canada a real patriotic service but will be making an investment that cannot be equalled, because as securito behind the bonds offered there is the entire wealth of Canada.

PROVINCE GOES DRY

Toronto, Oct. 21 .-- Ontario goes "dry" by an overwhelming majority. The counting of the ballots in the political campaign had priority over the referendum count, and therefore the figures on the latter vote are exceedingly incomplete. It is already evident, however, that the majority in favor of prohibition

will be huge.

With the object of ascertaining the extent of the sweeping prohibition victory, a summary was made of sixteen urban centres, including Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa, Windsor and other cities which were not notably on the side of prohibition This estimate gives ample "No"

This estimate gives ample "No" majorities for questions 1 and 3, upon which the closing of the bars and private liquor shops hinge.

In regard to questions 2 and 4, providing for Government sale of light beer and spirits in Government shops, small majorities were given for Government sale.

Throughout the Province gener ally, and in rural ridings especially the prohibition sweep is overwhelmingly great. Some of the typical constituencies, such as North Grey, gave votes of over three to one for prohibition. Even in the north, where it was believed that the liquor interests would polla large proportion of the vote, it was found that prohibition had been adopted by substantial majorities.
