COMPULSORY VOTING There has been at one time and anoth a considerable share of talk about compulsory voting, but nothing has come of it in the shape of legislation.

We offer a practical suggestion. Let the Ontario Legislature at its first ession enact a statute providing for compulsory voting at all bye elections held in Ontario for the next two or three years. If it worked well, as we are confident it would, then make it apply to the next gen-

eral election for Ontario.

The experiment is abundantly worth trying. Successful is elections for the Ontario islature, it would soon be applied to

Dominion and municipal elections. This is not a partisan suggestion. There is no reason why Conservatives and Liberals might not unite heartily in perfecting the cessary experimental legislation.

At present in every contest the energies of those who take an interest in public affairs are devoted chiefly, not to reason able discussion of public questions, but to the degrading task of begging the electors to be kind enough to exercise the fran-

Think, too, of self-respecting candidate on either side being expected to beg person ally for votes—as if it were less degrading to beg for votes than for cold potatoes !

Think of three-fourths of the effort of ampaign applied to what is euphemistically termed "getting out the vote," with all the lying, intimidation and corruption the phrase implies!

Let the electors be educated by law t get out the vote themselves.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE AND PER-SONAL LIBERTY.

A constant reader of the ADVERTISER raises one or two questions, to which we make reference as follows: The majority of intelligent Christians,

whilst not desiring to see Sunday made a day of gloomy sadness, are anxious that it shall be preserved from the work and worry of the rest of the week, because they believe this is in the highest interest of the race. The experience of nations which keep the seventh day, and of those that, like France at a certain period of her history, have abolished it, has proved conclusively that Sabbath-keeping tends to order, prosperity and power. The statistics gathered by manufacturers, of the work done by men observing the seventh day, and by those who hebitually violate it, have repeatedly shown that these who

have, with many, all the plausibility and force of argument. The fact, however, may very readily be admitted that Sunday laws do restrict individual liberty withdo restrict individual liberty with-out in the least impairing the mighty arguments in favor of the day of rest. The arguments in layer of the day of real. And same objection may be urged, and in many cases with greater force, against nearly all the laws that regulate our complex society. In society duly organized no one can pos-sibly enjoy the unlimited rights and un-trammeled freedom of nature. This is part of the penalty we pay for our civilization for the safety we enjoy under good laws and the unnumbered advantages of social

life. Every man's personal liberty in society must end just where the rights of his neighbor or the good of the general

dividual liberty either dictated by a sens of public justice or mercy or by the general good will crowd upon the mind of the reader. Take the law against cruelty to apimals. The owner may well say, "My horse is my own, I have a perfect right to over-work or beat him if I choose." Yet we say through our laws that he shall not, and no one objects on the ground of per sonal liberty. The laws requiring clean premises, strict notice in case of infectious diseases, and other regulations for the diseases, and other regulations of not violations, of individual liberty. Yet who objects to them, since all admit they are for the public safety?

In our laws concerning ed have many compulsory regulations that can only be justified on the ground that the public weal demands them. John Stuart Mill justifies the law of compulsory educa-tion of children on the plea that the safety of the State requires it, and yet, with strange inconsistency, he holds Sabbatarian legislation is an illegitimat sterference with the rightful liberty of the individual."
