Class II—Cheese to be made from Oct. 15th to 30th, one white cheese, prizes, 1st \$25, 2nd \$15, 3rd \$10; one colored cheese, prizes, 1st \$25, 2nd \$15, 3rd \$10.

Class III—Creamery butter, one 56-lb box, prizes, 1st \$25, 2nd \$15, 3rd \$10; ten 1-lb prints, prizes, 1st \$10, 2nd \$5, 3rd \$3. prints, prizes, 1st \$10, 2nd \$5, 3rd \$3.

Entered the Chinese Capital on the 15th of August.

Li Hung Changs - eport Says They Were Unopposed-All Quiet at Shanghai-Li Hung Chang Asks for an Armistice-Reply of the United States.

from Shanghai says: The allies entered Pekin Aug. 15. It is believed that Yuan Shi Kai's troops have gone thence to Shen Si to protect the empress, who, according to reports received by officials here, with Tuan, the imperial household and the bulk of the army and the Boxers, left Pekin Aug. 7 for Hsian Fu.

Chinese officials in Shanghai are reported as admitting that the allies inflicted a heavy defeat on the Chinese imperial troops around Tung Chau on Sunday, and then marched direct on Pekin. Shanghai dispatches declare that the Chinese had intended to make a final attack upon the legations last Sunday.
