ANOTHER CAPTURE

The Boer Commandant Buys Worsted in an Attack on

British Railroad Pioneers—Hague Tribunal

Will Not Interfere.

London, Nov. 21.—A dispatch from Lord Kitchener, dated from Pretoria, Nov. 21, says Commandant Buys has been captured after attacking a patrol of 100 railroad pioneers, on the Vaal River, near Villersdorp.

NO CHANCE FOR THE BOERS' APPEAL.

The Hague, Nov. 20.—The administrative council for the court of arbitration decided today that it was incompetent to consider the Boer appeal for intervention in the war in South Africa.

THAT SUSPECTED STEAMER.

London, Nov. 20.—The steamer which the government caused to be detained yesterday at the Victoria docks is named the Banagh. She had been used to carry passengers between London and Aberdeen, and was sold three weeks ago ostensibly for use in the West Indian fruit trade. It was at first suggested that the vessel was laden with contraband of war destined for the Boers, but it is now vaguely suggested that any contraband on board of her was intended for Colombia. Customs officers are still on board the Banagh.

PRESIDENCE OF THE PLAGUE.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 20.—The British steamer Monmouth (Capt. Troop) which has arrived from South Africa, reports the existence of over 800 cases of bubonic plague in the vicinity of Cape Town. Up to the time she sailed some 350 deaths from the plague had occurred.

threatening the nation. In his opinion it was an unnecessary and unjust war. It was a war of false pretenses, and a war of aggression. A lot of persons finally stormed the platform and the meeting broke up in great disorder.

On the stock exchange the brokers were much stirred up by the utterances of Mr. Patteson Nickalls, and in the absence of business, they passed the time in singing "God Save the King" and making various other demonstrations against the unpopular member.

SPECULATORS CHECKMATED.

London, Nov. 20.—King Edward has checkmated the thrifty British nobles and others who proposed to line their pockets with gold by the sale of their seats in Westminster Abbey for the coronation ceremony, by decreeing that except in an official capacity only British subjects are to be present. He has decided that the mere fact of any seat being sold disposes both the holder and the nominee from the right of occupying it. It is understood that large sums have been offered, both in America and Europe, for seats on the occasion of the coronation.

QUEEN DRAGA SHOT AT.

Vienna, Nov. 20.—An unconfirmed rumor has reached Vienna that Queen Draga has been shot at in the streets of Belgrade. The Neue Freie Presse and other Vienna papers publish various rumors, one declaring that the Serbian queen was assassinated, and other that she was wounded, and a third that she committed suicide. Statements from other sources deny the statement that Queen Draga was killed and assert that the rumor of her death was caused by a hysterical scene with King Alexander.

There is no reliable information on the subject here, but it is generally believed that a serious crisis exists.

Paris, Nov. 21.—According to a dispatch from Vienna, the Echo de Paris, an attempt has been made to assassinate the Queen of Serbia, three shots having been fired at her while she was driving near Semlin.

A dispatch to the same paper from Belgrade gives a rumor that the queen attempted suicide at Semlin.

Draga Mascheno, King of the Serbs' consort, has been the cause of many sensations in Belgrade since she came into the public eye. She was born of an army surgeon, when the king married her. She had formerly been a lady-in-waiting to Queen Natalie.

Draga's father resigned as commander-in-chief of the army. The cabinet also resigned. The reaction of most of his most influential supporters led the young king to seek friends among the radicals, to whom his choice of a queen from the people was not displeasing.

HOMES FOR LONDON'S POOR.

London, Nov. 21.—In a short time London County Council will possess 250 blocks of workmen's dwellings, yielding an annual rent of \$305,000.

The project of housing the London poor involves the expenditure from the city treasury of \$2,000,000. This sum is expected to furnish houses for 92,000 persons.

In January next homes for 2,200 persons will be ready for occupancy. In February 256 more will be available. In May, in July 472, all the houses in Battersea, Dulwich, and St. Pancras, in Clerkenwell, Tottenham Fields, and Swan Lane home will be furnished during the coming year for thousands of the poor.

The biggest scheme of all is that known as the White Hart Lane, Tottenham, scheme, which, for building 10,000 houses, will cost £1,500,000 to effect, and upon which 34,381 persons will be accommodated.

Recent progress in the progress in many other parts of the congested districts of the city, and nearly all buildings projected will be completed during the year.

Disappointment was felt at Lord Strathcona's reported statement, made at Queenstown, that the fast Atlantic line negotiations are yet in their infancy. Recent Canadian cablegrams have another expression. Lord Strathcona, in the interview in question, also said that the available Canadian capital was not sufficient to carry out the English terminal, the high commission, via Quebec, would be the route decided upon, but he thought that would be left to the opinion of the contractors.

Lord and Lady Mount Stephen will entertain the Prince of Wales at the Brocket Hall, Hertfordshire, for a few days' shooting in December. The prince will accompany the prince, whose visit is expected to take place about the 19th.

TWENTY JEWS KILLED IN RIOT.

Rumors from Warsaw say that 20 Jews have been killed in anti-semitic disturbances at Olivopol.

THIRTEENTH MOVE MADE.

When Dr. Krause, the former governor of Johannesburg, arrested Sept. 10, on charges of high treason and inciting to murder, was brought up on remand at Bow street yesterday for the thirteenth time, the treasury representative made much excitement by announcing that they withdrew the application for the prisoner's extradition to South Africa, and wanted Krause committed to the Old Bailey on charges of high treason and incitement to murder. The treasury officials consider there is ample justification to try Krause here on the charge of incitement to murder, but he thought a public prosecutor of Johannesburg, executed September 30, to murder Douglas Foster, an English lawyer attached to Robert's court, who was very active against the Boers. Witnesses were called to support the charges.
