St. Petersburg, Oct. 28. — The robber Chuncho tribesmen, who recently entrenched themselves at Bodone, a town on the Sungacha River, Manchuria, had previously attacked a Russian cargo steamer at a station on the Manchurian railway near Bodone. They massacred the entire crew and then attacked the Russian guards, killing 45. Further reinforcements have been ordered from Harbin to Bodone to dislodge the Chuncho.

ACCORDING TO HALF THE BATTLE PROFESSOR HICKS ALREADY WON

Weather Will Be Much Like Other Novembers. Says English Press of Mr. Chamberlain's Campaign.

STORMY AND PLEASANT IN TURN HE IS CONFIDENT OF SUCCESS

Rain and an Occasional Dash of Snow, Sunshine Afternoons and Frosty Nights.

Chicago, Oct. 30.—Rev. I. R. Hicks, of St. Louis, has issued his bulletin of forecasts for the weather which may be looked for in November. The following contains the gist of them:

The storm diagram for this month shows that a regular Vulcan storm period is central on the 1st. The moon is also on the celestial equator on the same date, passing from south to north declination. By the 1st storm conditions will be organized in the west, and the doing area over the barometer will advance eastwardly across the country, causing higher temperature, rain and possibly thunder storms in many sections on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd. Rain and high temperature will give way to rising barometer, with possibly gusts of snow, westerly winds and much colder on the 4th, 5th and 6th. The Vulcan storm period, extending from the 10th to the 15th, is central on the 12th, covering the period extending from the 7th to the 19th, is central on the 13th, hence the combined perturbations of these two forces will be felt during the Vulcan period. Moon is in perigee on the 10th, at last quarter on the 11th, and on the celestial equator, going southward on the 14th. About the 12th to 15th may reasonably be expected the most general and active storm centers of the month. As early as the 10th the barometer will be falling in the west, China sea, and will attend the falling barometer, and during the 11th to 15th these conditions will pass over the country, moving eastward, bringing rain and snow storms to most parts of the country. A very decided dash of early winter will bring up the rear of these storms, giving several cold days and frosty nights to most parts before the entrance of the next storm period.

A reactionary storm period is central from the 17th to the 20th, having the new moon or moon in conjunction with earth and sun on the 19th. This period will bring return of rising temperature, falling barometer and wide areas of cloudiness, rain and snow. The culmination of these disturbances will fall on and next to the 19th. At this time autumnal rains will set in, and in high latitudes, and Atlantic coast regions, with dashes of snow and change to much colder over all northern to central parts of the country. The cold will march into the south along with the high barometer following these disturbances.

A regular storm period is central on the 24th, covering with its influence the 22nd to the 27th. As a rule the first two or three days of the regular storm periods are fair and growing warmer, with falling barometer, and easterly to southerly winds. Then follow cloudiness, storm and precipitation, progressively from west to east. Behind the great low, threatening rain, rising barometer, snow and cold, west winds follow, all ending in cold, clear weather. This order of phenomena will transpire, about the 22nd to 26th, but the cold fair weather following the storms will be of short duration. Reactionary storm conditions will prevail as the month goes on, bringing unsettled, threatening and stormy weather. Upon the whole, the outlook for November is not so perturbed and stormy as October promised to be, and no unusual or exceptional extent. In fact, much pleasant, autumnal weather may be expected through November and into December. All who observe the dates of storm periods in the foregoing forecasts will be fully apprised and forearmed against all unpleasant storm and weather visitations.

Quotes Gladstone in Support of His Policy—The Workman's Wage.

London, Oct. 30.—Yesterday morning's press comments on Mr. Chamberlain's speech at Birmingham say that he gave the wage-earners very much to think about and to talk over, and that with a good deal of what Mr. Chamberlain said there will be on their part a cordial agreement. Mr. Chamberlain, before leaving Liverpool, declared himself more content than ever of success. He did not think he had accomplished as much as he had found out. He was bound to win.

Combating Lord Goschen, Mr. Chamberlain declared that extra prices to the consumer bore no real proportion to the cost of taxes. Figures were the only illustrations to an argument, and he had been looking at the figures, and had come to a different conclusion to that of Lord Goschen. He appealed past Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Sir William Harcourt and Mr. Ritchie, to a Chancellor greater than all, Gladstone, who said: "If 92 years of the working classes had been looking at the figures, and had come to a different conclusion to that of Lord Goschen, he would have taken steps for the encouragement of the cotton industry in India or the West Indies."

There was too much trusting to luck with the British Empire and its industries. He reminded his audience that the experiment of protection could do no harm, and that the states had proved that protection did not mean disaster. British exports, not German or American, had declined under foreign protection, and a protected industry could undersell free trade. The time must come when there would come a cycle of bad trade, and then the things he dreaded might be counteracted by the influence of working classes. He hoped to seize the first opportunity to alter the system under which this was possible. The doctrine of a tax for revenue, he said, was justifiable, but he condemned the theory that the whole country and advanced imperial ideas as repugnant.

The Mail says "It will be in England as it was in Australia, Canada, Germany and France, where protection has been carried on by the votes of the working-men."

Right Hon. W. H. Long, President of the Liberal Government, speaking last night at Trowbridge, said that the recommendation by the Government must be made the fiscal policy, as the only means to secure the return of imperial prosperity.

The council of the Dublin Chamber of Commerce has declared in favor of a rearrangement of the local policy. The Yorkshire Daily Observer says the protectionist case, as further unfolded by Mr. Chamberlain, gains neither in interest or cogency.

The Manchester Courier says: "Half the battle originated by Mr. Chamberlain is won." The Manchester Guardian says: "Mr. Chamberlain was not arguing. He was simply telling us."

The Vossische Zeitung, Berlin, says: "The reason why Germany trade is able to enter successfully into competition with English trade is because the German knows better how to adapt itself to foreign tastes. It suits Mr. Chamberlain's purposes better to describe the vigorous and rapid growth of the German trade as a direct consequence of an organized system of premiums and state subsidies, and to pass over the really decisive factor."

FIGHTING IN PARIS

The Police and Rioters Have Serious Clash.

Paris, Oct. 30.—The prefect of police personally commanded the operations at the Bourse de Travail yesterday. The display of force made in the afternoon was much greater than that of the morning, and included the mounted municipal guards, of whom 100 were drawn up before the door of the bourse when the meeting concluded. Fighting followed an attempt to break through the police line, and several were wounded. A desperate fight resulted, when the police charged the building. The police were armed with their drawn swords and the demonstrators in many cases wore knuckle dusters and carried knives. After the building was cleared the fighting was continued in the street. Of the injured only four appear to be seriously hurt.
