

THE KAISER IN LOVE

Says Nice Things About Empress at Son's Betrothal.

Berlin, Sept. 22. — In military circles there is great surprise, very subdued, but very intense, that the Kaiser is still much in love with his own wife. When the announcement of Crown Prince William's engagement to marry the Duchess Cecelia was made at the dinner given by the Emperor and Empress to the personages of Schleswig-Holstein, the Emperor with much fervor indirectly offered this toast to his imperial spouse, who, of course, was a Princess of Schleswig-Holstein: "Thanks to her charity for the poor and her affection for the suffering, she thanks to the manner in which she develops among our people religious sentiment and love of family, the image of the Empress, as popular as that of Queen Louise of Prussia, is engraved in ineffable lines, on the hearts of all her subjects."

"So in raising my glass to drink to the prosperity of Schleswig-Holstein I think especially of my well-beloved wife, noble daughter of this fine country which the sea laves with its waters. May God guard her, the first of all the women of Germany, may he preserve her, the benefactress of all, to be loved by all, even to the most remote time."

"Hurrah for her majesty! Hurrah for her province!"

Her husband's loving words, more significant at the moment that their eldest child had chosen a bride, overcame her majesty with delighted emotions. The Emperor has shown another face of his many-sided genius. He designed to his slightest detail a fountain the plan of which he presented to the Sultan of Turkey, who, much pleased, has had the fountain constructed in Constantinople. It is of white marble, surmounted by the traditional Oriental dome. The Kaiser even wrote the dedicatory lines which, alternately in German and Turkish, are engraved on the fountain's sides.

FIGHT DUEL WITH AUTOS

Americans Introduce New Method of Settling Their Quarrels.

Paris, Sept. 22. — Bellicose Americans in Paris, who want to fight over the coming presidential election, have found a new use for motor cars, that of employing them as battering rams. M. Pierre Curial, a noted motorist, gives an account of a duel fought with motor cars between two Americans. Those names he refuses to disclose, on the road from Versailles. He says he was just rounding a curve near Carrefour de l'Étoile, when his chauffeur came to such an abrupt halt, both of them were nearly thrown from the middle of the road facing each other, completely blocked the way, with deep rashes on either side.

The chauffeurs of the two machines, elderly men, were in a stormy altercation. One yelled at the other: "You are a liar!" "What?" roared the other, and throwing on all his power at once, his machine leaped forward and gave the other machine a titanic ram. The force of the awful impact drove the two autos apart, whereupon the furious chauffeur of the rammed machine threw on all his power and smashed into his assailant's machine with a roar.

Again and again this was repeated, both chauffeurs swearing like pirates. Finally, the machine of the first assailant dashed into the other with such terrific force as to carry both machines over the embankment and down the sides to the bottom, where both were completely demolished.

With the two companions of the men, who had leaped from the autos at the beginning of the fray, M. Curial carried the wounded and unconscious contestants to the road, placed them in his car and drove to their homes in the city.

One of the men is dying. The contestants were two Americans, who had agreed to fight each other somewhere in some manner, because of a bitter dispute concerning the relative merits of Roosevelt and Parker. When they met they quarreled over weapons and dashed at each other in their cars.

FOR EAST NIPissing

Liberals Nominate E. A. McCool for the Dominion House.

North Bay, Ont., Sept. 22. — A Liberal convention was held here yesterday for the purpose of nominating a candidate to contest East Nipissing in the next general election for the Dominion House. Five men were nominated, but all retired except Mr. E. A. McCool, who was the present member. A vote was taken which resulted in favor of Mr. McCool. On motion of Mr. Macdonald, the nomination was unanimously given to Mr. McCool. In the evening a meeting was held in the opera house.

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EVIDENCE IN NORTH YORK CASE

Judges Hold Pegg Charge Proven But Hon. Mr. Davis Not Responsible.

Newmarket, Sept. 21. — Further evidence in the Pegg charge was taken at the North York trial this afternoon, and that branch of the case was argued by counsel.

Marx Hall, farmer, said that he had been told by Hodge that he found Pegg's manure pile on a manure pile some 20 feet from the stable. Alfred Hall, his brother, was present at the meeting between Pegg and Hodge when Pegg made his demand. Alfred said that Hodge had pointed to the manure pile as the place where the money was left.

"Was anything said about a fifty-dollar reward?" asked Mr. Aylesworth.

"Yes," answered Alfred Hall. "He mentioned that \$50 was being offered, and he said that he expected to get it."

"What did Hodge tell you about that?" was asked of Wm. Tansley, the farmer who was present also at the meeting between Hodge and Pegg. "Harry pointed out the manure pile as the place where he found the money," he said. "Mr. Lennox was offering \$50 for every 45 paid by the Davis men, but he had already done so."

Israel Hyson gave the sheep pen as the place where Hodge told him that he had found Pegg's money.

"I met Hodge just after the election," he said. "He told me that Pegg had taken some money from his pocket-book, and said to watch lest he should drop it. He then put his hands behind his back and walked towards the sheep pen. When there he dropped it. The pen is about 20 feet from the stable."

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EMPLOYERS TO MEET EMPLOYEES

Canadian Capital and Labor to Confer Over Their Differences.

Montreal, Sept. 22. — At yesterday's session of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association some important matters were disposed of.

One of the most important decisions reached was the approval by the convention of a proposal that the association take an excursion to Great Britain next summer. A number of members spoke heartily in favor of the proposal, and it was decided to leave action to the executive committee.

Another important decision was that a conference should be held between the manufacturers and the representatives of labor, and representatives of these two important bodies which attend to the respective interests of capital and labor will meet and discuss their differences in the near future.

Their meeting in this city has been an almost general feeling that good results might be obtained if it were possible to have the associations meet together through representatives. The matter took tangible form when General Secretary Young, of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, and a letter from the Trades and Labor Council of Canada, asking that a meeting should be held with a view to adjusting differences between employer and employee. The letter was very heartily received, and it was left with the secretary to arrange a date on which the meeting should take place.

A good portion of the afternoon session was taken up with the consideration of the reports of the railway and transportation committee, and the parliamentary committee, which reviewed the work of the past year, and were adopted.

A delegation representing the Lord's Day Alliance was also present in convention, and urged the strict observance of the Lord's Day. The delegation received a most cordial reception.

The most important subject to be considered by the association was the tariff question, which will be discussed today.

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
