As he made his way towards the building the soldier shouted words of encouragement, and climbing over a heap of ruins he entered the building and in the cellar found the bodies of three children Near them was a woman barely alive who by almost superhuman efforts lasting for hours had succeeded in freeing herself from a mass of debris which had fallen on her. To Electrify the C. P. R.

Ottawa, April 10.-It is learned that the Canadian Pacific Company has decided to await the outcome of experiments by the New York Central and New York, New Haven and Hartford Railway Companies before taking steps for the electrification of any part of its system. Both the latter railways are spending enormous sums upon experiments, the former with a direct current and the latter with a single phase alternating current. Once the electrification of steam railways on a large scale has passed beyond the experimental stage, there is little doubt that the C. P. R. will be prepared to adopt the system. They have accumulated a lot of data on the subject, and will be prepared to act at the earliest possible moment. The line from Montreal to Quebec will in all probability witness the first installation. All the electric power necessary can be obtained from Shawinigan Falls, providing the price is satisfactory. That, however, it is presumed, can easily be arranged.
