Ex-Mayor John D. Wilson stated today that a deputation of medical men and others will wait on the city coun-

erecting a hospital for consumptives. It is taken for granted that the county council will make a grant for the purpose, and it is now up to the city to say whether or not an asylum shall

Dr. Wilson says that it is his idea to buy a farm somewhere in the neighborhood of London and in a desirable location, for the sanatorium, and to make the farm self-sustaining, if possible, by reason of the labor of the patients who would be able to work.

The doctor thinks that a suitable farm could be bought for not more than \$7,000, and that a sanatorium large enough for present needs could be erected for about \$3,000. The farm Member of Famous Stage Family house could be used for administrative purposes.



The Entire Eastern Wholesale Section of Prairie Capital Was Threatened-With Destruction.

Winnipeg, Jan. 28 .- Fire of unknown tomorrow. All the eastbound passen- origin, which broke out to night in the premises occupied as a branch by the boot and shoe manufacturing firm of J. D. King & Co., Toronto, was one of the most disastrous which has visited the city for several years. The building was a handsome five-story structure, 66 by 120, owned by Bright & Johnston, wholesale fruit merchants, and was completely gutted. A number of eastern firms had warerooms therein, among the number being W. Paterson & Co., biscuit and confectionery manufacturers, Brantford; Copeland, Chatterson Company, Toronto; J. D. King & Co., boots and shoes, Toronto; F. F. Dalley & Co., Hamilton. Other tenants were Rattray, & Cameron, Pulford-Leonard Drug crockery, and all the stocks carried by

The fire at one time threatened the entire eastern wholesale section of the city, but the splendid work of the brigade, with their new equipment, including the water tower, in spite of the origade, with their new equipment, inrluding the water tower, in spite of the intense cold, confined the flames to the ouilding in which they originated.

The warehouse was valued at \$40,000 and was insured for \$24,000 in the Law. Union and Crown Company, represented here by Osler, Nanton & Hammond. Owners carried rental insurance to the extent of \$6,000 per annum, with policies of \$2,000 each in the Sun, Quebec and Royal Companies.
