MOVING TO HEAD OFF LEON LING'S ESCAPE

Slayer of Elsie Sigel Believed To
Be Aboard Ship Now in
Suez Canal.

New York, July 6.—In the hope of capturing Leon Ling, the accused slayer of Elsie Sigel, the police have just cabled to several cities on the Mediterranean coast and to points through the Suez Canal and Indian Ocean to hold up the German steamship Helene Rickmers, and search it for the fugitive. Information is almost conclusive, the police say, that Ling shipped from Philadelphia between June 19 and 12. The murder was committed on June 9. Further information has just come to the police, saying that the ship on which the Chinaman took passage was bound for the Orient. In looking up the records, detectives found that the Helene Rickmers left Philadelphia on June 12, bound for Itoaki, Japan, and that before sailing, her commander, Captain Getting, had shipped several Chinamen as part of the crew. Among these Chinamen, who were engaged only for a short time before sailing, was one well-dressed man who spoke good English and who professed to be an efficient cook. Leon Ling wore good clothes, spoke English fluently and was a master cook.

Making to Japan. The Helene Rickmers was the only vessel which left Philadelphia at about that time for the Orient. The vessel is now believed to be either approaching or just out of the Suez Canal. It was last reported at Tarifa, a seaport town of Spain, fifteen miles southwest from Gibraltar, on June 26. Central office detectives would not discuss how the information came to them, but, according to the Philadelphia police, the agents of the steamship observed the report of Captain Getting concerning the listing of a Chinese cook, and they compared their list with the descriptions of Leon Ling and notified the authorities.

Captain Carey, of the homicide bureau, was surprised when he heard that this information had leaked out, but he said that he regarded it as the best clue he had yet had as to the escape of the much wanted man. As soon as the police learned that the Helene Rickmers was bound for Japan, and that it had shipped a Chinese cook, they cabled every port between Tarifa, Spain, and Itoaki, Japan, at which the German steamship might report.

TURNED SOD AT SITE OF THE NEW CHURCH

Important Dedication Ceremony by
Christian Workers.

The dedication ceremonies of the new Christian Workers' Church, which will be built on Ottawa avenue, were held last night on the site of the church, before a large number of people.

The service was opened by a prayer by the pastor, followed by the singing of a hymn, after which the pastor, Rev. G. C. Booth, gave a short address, in which he outlined five reasons why the work of building the church had been undertaken: To save souls; to do good to the people around; to preach the gospel; to glorify God; and to provide for the growing needs of the church. He expressed the hope that the church might be a power for good in the community, and he remarked that because of it he was the proudest man in the city that night. Then, after the singing of another hymn, Mr. Booth turned the first sod. All the members of the board—Messrs. W. Whittingham, S. D. Beetham, J. Easley, L. Barton, P. Pugh, J. Wilson and A. Weston—also turned a sod, and gave short addresses, speaking of the way God had blessed the work. Mr. George McPherson closed the ceremony with prayer.

The building will be a frame structure 50 feet long and 33 feet wide, and will have a seating capacity of 400. It will cost \$2,000.

NEW CUNARD TERMINAL
Point in New South Wales To Be Used
in Future.

New York, July 6.—After giving the matter their consideration for the last three months, the directors of the Cunard Line have decided to make the experiment of having their mail and passenger steamships call at Fishguard, on the coast of Pembrokeshire, South Wales, to save time on the outward and homeward voyages.

Fishguard is thirty-two miles nearer to Queenstown than Holyhead, and one hundred and eighty miles nearer than Liverpool. This means a saving of at least six hours against Liverpool, and would enable passengers on the line to reach London and Mauretanla to be certain of reaching London at a reasonable hour on Monday night, and those on the nights, sailing from New York on the preceding Wednesday. West-bound liners should land their passengers here on Thursday, and Fridays respectively, according to the speed of the ship. It is understood that the first experiment of landing passengers from Lusitania, sailing from this side on July 28.

DETECTIVE SLAYER
EXPIATES HIS CRIME

Sanducci Goes to Electric Chair
for Murdering of Police
Official.

Auburn, N. Y., July 6.—Giuseppe Sanducci, who murdered Joseph Dardano, an Italian detective, at Belfast, Alleghty County, on the morning of Dec. 21, 1907, was put to death in the electric chair in Auburn prison at 6:18 o'clock this morning. The execution was one of the most successful in the history of the prison, and was remarkable for the celerity with which it was carried out, lasting for three seconds only, and the second being in less than ten seconds' duration. The voltage was 1,000 and it ranged from 3 1/2 to 4 amperes.

Sanducci's crime was committed in the bright light of day, and in the presence of 40 or 50 people. The scene at the railroad station in Belfast early in the morning of Dec. 21, 1907.

It was a sequel to the arrest of his employer, Michael Sanducci, on a charge of violation of liquor tax laws, by Detectives Dardano and Mantica, of Albany.

The arrest was made before the shooting. Sanducci, after Deleccio was held on the charge, waited until the following morning before starting for Albany. They were just boarding the train when four shots were fired. Mantica was wounded in the head, but recovered. Dardano was shot twice, one bullet striking him under the right shoulder-blade, and proving fatal. The fourth shot that was fired went through a mail bag.

After the shooting Sanducci escaped on a hand car, but a piece of 40 or 50 calibre bullet captured him within three hours. He was tried and convicted, and on April 2, 1908, was sentenced to die in the electric chair. An appeal to the court of appeals resulted in an affirmation of the judgment of death on May 19, 1908.
