MR. BINGHAM ACCEPTS CALL TO TALBOT ST.

Will Take Over the Pastorate the First Sunday in September.

At the regular prayer meeting held in the Talbot Street Baptist Church last evening a letter was read from Rev. Hubert H. Bingham, of Paris, accepting the unanimous call which the congregation tendered him last week. Mr. Bingham will take over his new pastorate on the first Sunday in September.

Rev. A. J. Vining, the present pastor, leaves for Europe early in July to commence the work of founding a big Baptist university at some central European point which he will select. The pulpit will be supplied by outside preachers from the time Mr. Vining leaves until Mr. Bingham takes charge.

Mr. Bingham's letter of acceptance was as follows:

"The communication expressing your wish that I should become pastor of the Talbot Street Baptist Church, was placed in my hands by your committee last Saturday evening, and has received my most careful consideration. The fact that the invitation was so unanimous has helped me in coming to a conclusion, other inviting offers being before me at the same time. In fact, the burden of my prayer was that if the Lord wanted me in Talbot Street, He would make the way clear, and if not, He would raise up objections."

"In the light of the call which you so graciously extend, I, in the same spirit, accept it, and shall be glad to work with you for the welfare of our Father's Kingdom, commencing the first Sunday in September."

"I might say that in making this decision I am leaving a most loyal and consecrated people. The deacons have already stated that since the Lord has called me to a larger field, they cannot stand in my way. Wishing you and your retiring pastor God's blessing, I am, yours sincerely, (Signed) H. H. BINGHAM."

At the conclusion of the letter, the Lord was called upon to bless the congregation rose at once and sang.

MRS. BARBARA BEGG DEAD

Was One of London's Oldest and Most Highly Esteemed Residents.

One of London's oldest and most highly esteemed residents died at her home, 354 Adelaide street, this morning, in the person of Mrs. Barbara Beggs, wife of Mr. James Beggs. Mrs. Beggs had been ill for two days, and the news of her death will come as a sad surprise to her many friends. On Tuesday she suffered a paralytic stroke, and never rallied. She was 79 years old and had resided in London for more than a quarter of a century. Mrs. Beggs took deep interest in church work, and was one of the oldest members of the King Street Presbyterian Church. She was at one time president of the Ladies' Aid of the church, and a very active worker.

Mrs. Beggs was born in Aberdeen, Scotland, and settled in London, Hamilton, where her husband was employed in the old Great Western shops. When the shops were moved to London, Mr. and Mrs. Beggs came here, and have lived here ever since. Besides her husband, she is survived by three daughters—Mrs. Donald McKenzie, of Hamilton; Mrs. (Rev.) John Caldwell, of Nassau, Mich.; Mrs. Fred Pickles, of Santa Anna, Cal.; three sons—James, of Nanaimo, B. C., and John and William, of this city; one brother, Mr. Wm. Fraser, of Hamilton, also survives. The funeral will be held Saturday afternoon at Woodland Cemetery, and the services will be conducted by Rev. James Rollins.

GOV.-GENERAL SAYS FAREWELL

Earl Grey Made His Last Official Appearance Yesterday.

MAKES TOUCHING SPEECH

Replies to an Address of Appreciation From the Members of the Commons and Senate.

Ottawa, May 5.—The text of the Parliamentary address to Earl Grey, presented at the closing of the Commons yesterday, and His Excellency's reply follows:

The Parliamentary address was as follows:

"We, his majesty's dutiful and loyal Parliament assembled, beg leave to convey to your excellency an expression of the general feeling of regret with which all classes of this country have learned that your official connection with Canada is soon to cease."

"It must be a source of gratification to your excellency on your retirement from the high office of governor-general, to realize that the period of your administration has been marked by general and increasing prosperity in every portion of the Dominion."

"The zeal with which your excellency has sought by personal observation to gain an intimate knowledge of the character, possibilities and requirements of every section of the country has been justly appreciated by the people of Canada."

"The special interest which your excellency has taken in everything calculated to foster a high sense of public duty and responsibility, to stimulate intellectual development and to advance science and art will long be gratefully remembered, while the success of your endeavors in cultivating the growth of a Canadian spirit, the full development of our national life is compatible with the closest and most loyal connection with the empire."

"The National Park established on the Plains of Abraham will remain as an enduring monument to your excellency's wise and enlightened efforts to this end."

"We beg that your excellency will express to the King our loyal attachment to his majesty's throne and accord to your united resolve to accomplish our part in the maintenance and upbuilding of his majesty's empire."

In saying farewell to your excellency and family, we cannot refrain from expressing our appreciation of the important and gracious part taken by her Excellency the Countess Grey in the success which has marked the discharge of your high responsibilities and labors, the helpful, generous and sympathetic co-operation afforded by her excellency, and by your daughters, Lady Sybil and Lady Evelyn, in performance of your public and social duties, has won for them an enduring place in the affection and respect of the Canadian people."

"In conclusion, we beg to assure your excellency that you will always have our warmest wishes for the future happiness of yourself and family."

The Earl Replies.

Earl Grey's response was as follows:

"It is with feelings of no ordinary emotion that I acknowledge the great honor conferred upon me today by the Parliament of the Dominion."

"That address, the kind and friendly speeches of its movers and seconders, its hearty and unanimous acceptance by members of the Senate, and of the House of Commons, have caused me to realize afresh how great has been the interest and enjoyment of our life in Canada, and how sincere and heartfelt is the regret with which I and all the members of my family view the approaching termination of my term."

"Thanks to increased transportation facilities, thanks more to the great kindness which I have received in every part of the Dominion, I have had abundant opportunity, probably more abundant than has ever been vouchsafed to man, to make myself closely acquainted with the high hopes and confident beliefs of the Canadian people; to watch with ever-increasing delight the rapid and unchecked unfolding of your amazing developments, and to form a more or less adequate estimate of your tremendous potentialities."

A Wonderful Future.

"Gentlemen, when I reflect on the vastness of your area, on the fertility of your soil, on the unlimited wealth of your natural resources, which I realize, you are determined, scientifically, to conserve, as well as vigorously develop; when I reflect upon the invigorating nature of your climate, and on the strenuous character of your people; when I reflect on all these great advantages which you possess in such abundant and exceptional degree, gentlemen, I feel as constrained as I am that tomorrow's sun will rise that if you keep true to the highest ideals of duty and disinterested service, nothing can prevent you from becoming, perhaps before the close of the present century, not only the granary, but the heart and soul and ruler of the empire."

"It shall be my happy privilege on my return to England, to submit to the King an expression of your devotion to his throne and person also to impress upon his majesty and on the
