THE EMPEROR'S CUP

Feature Event of Japanese Horse
Racing Comes Today to
a Canadian.

WOODBINE TURNED TRICK

Mr. J. C. Fletcher Cables From Yoko-
hama That He Has Carried Off
the Big Prize.

Toronto, Oct. 29.—The Star says: The Emperor's Cup race run today at Yokohama, Japan, and corresponding in importance to the Derby in England, and the King's Plate in Canada, was won by a Toronto man, Mr. J. C. Fletcher, who for the past seven years has been in the Flowery Kingdom as manager for the Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada. The horse that won the cup was named Woodbine, after the Toronto course. Mr. Fletcher had another horse in the race named Bluebonnets, after the Montreal course.

In a letter to his brother, Mr. A. G. Fletcher, inspector of the Metropolitan Bank, Toronto, a short time ago, he said he thought he had a good chance with one of these horses for the cup, and promised to cable the name of the winner on the day of the race. Today the cable came containing the one word, "Woodbine."

The Japanese have taken very warmly to racing during recent years. Last year Mr. Fletcher got second in the Japanese Derby, the second race in importance. He has signified that as soon as he won the Emperor's Cup he would be content to give up the sport.

Ford, First Big League Star to Own Signing With Fletcher

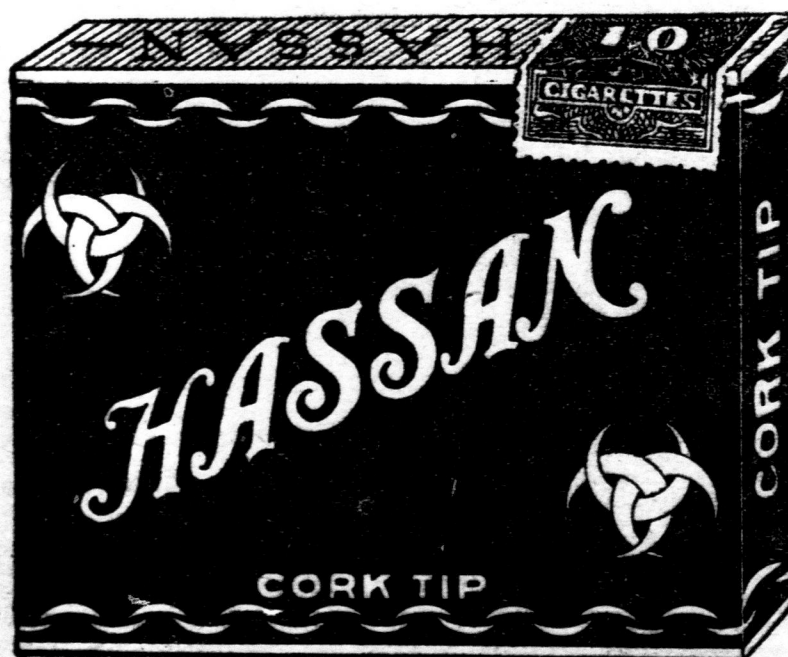

RECREATION PARK
SELLS FOR \$60,000

It Looks as if Pittsburgh Is To Have
Opposition Ball Next Spring.

Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 29.—Recreation Park, on the north side, used as a National League ball park years ago, was yesterday sold by the United States Realty Company to a western capitalist acting for the new Outlaw League of D. A. Fletcher.

The price paid was \$60,000. The purchaser announced the new circuit would include Chicago, Cleveland, Louisville, New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, St. Louis and possibly two other American Association cities. It was stated the American Association is interested, and is lending its support. Several businessmen have been asked to subscribe for stock.

The sale, coming on the heels of Fletcher's announcement in Chicago that he has 92 old league players under contract, indicates that Pittsburgh is to have opposition ball next spring.
