SAYS HE IS NOT GUILTY

Investigations By Sheriff Prove That Some Statements He Has Made Regarding His Movements Are Incorrect.

Ottawa, April 27.-Rev. James H Bell, incumbent of the Anglican Church, at Sutton. Que., is under arrest at Hull, and was arraigned before Recorder Desjarding today on charge of arson

The charge against the preacher is the result of allegations by residents of Kazabazua, where feet, Mr. Bell owns property. On Thursday last passers on the road near the house at Kazabazua noticed shooke issuing from the windows, and breaking in the doors managed to extinguish the fire. Inside were found a number of coal of cans and a metal matchease marked "Sutton," near where the fire had apparently started. Some of the villagers alleged that they had seen the minister dressed in ordinary clothes and wearing green goggles over his eyes, boarding the train on the night of the fire.

Sheriff Investigates.

Investigation by Sheriff Wright Showed that Rev. Mr. Bell had left his home at Sutton on Wednesday last, and had not returned until the following Saturday. Sheriff Wright went down to Sutton armed with a warrant for Mr. Bell's arrest, but on arrival there found Mr. Bell preparing to board the train. On being informed of the charge, Rev. Mr. Bell surrendered himself. He was arraigned this siternon, and, pleading not guilty, was allowed out on personal ball of \$500. The hearing was set for Monday. The charge against the preacher is

To the sheriff Rev. Mr. Bell denied any knowledge of how the fire started, and stated that he had spent the night at Montreal Hospital with his daughter, and the ensuing days with a brother minister, also at Montreal.
