

PASTOR ARRESTED FOR FIRING HOUSE

Anglican Minister in Custody at Hull, Quebec, On a Very Serious Charge.

SAYS HE IS NOT GUILTY

Investigation By Sheriff Prove That Some Statements He Has Made Regarding His Movements Are Incorrect.

Ottawa, April 27. Rev. James H. Bell, incumbent of the Anglican Church at Sutton, Que., is under arrest at Hull, and was arraigned before Recorder Desjardins today on a charge of arson.

The charge against the preacher is the result of allegations by residents of Kazabazua, where Rev. Mr. Bell owns property, that on Thursday last he fired the house at Kazabazua, and that he was seen in the house at the time of the fire.

Inside were found a number of coats of arms and a metal matchbox marked "Sutton," near which the house apparently started. Some of the villagers alleged that they had seen the minister dressed in ordinary clothes and wearing green goggles over his eyes, boarding the train on the night of the fire.

Sheriff Investigates.

Investigation by Sheriff Wright showed that Rev. Mr. Bell had left home at Sutton on Wednesday last, and had not returned until the following Saturday. Sheriff Wright went down to Sutton armed with a warrant for Mr. Bell's arrest, but on arrival there found Mr. Bell preparing to board the train. On being informed of the charge, Rev. Mr. Bell surrendered himself. He was arraigned this afternoon, and, pleading not guilty, was allowed out on personal bail of \$500. The hearing was set for Monday.

To the sheriff Rev. Mr. Bell denied any knowledge of how the fire started, and stated that he had spent the night at Montreal Hospital with his daughter, and the ensuing day with a brother minister, also at Montreal. Chief McCusick, of the provincial police, investigated the matter, and found it to be false, with the consequence that the warrant was issued.

The property which is alleged Bell endeavored to burn is insured for \$1,500.

SYNOD WILL MEET HERE NEXT YEAR

There Was Some Talk of Making London the Permanent Meeting Place.

At the meeting of the Synod of Hamilton and London, on motion of Mr. Currie and Dr. McTear, it was unanimously decided to hold the synod next year in London. In the discussion it was contended that London should be the permanent place of meeting for the synod. The following system has been done away with and the ministers and elders find their own entertainment at the hotels. London is more and more becoming a convention city.

SENT FOR TRIAL

Leslie Burk Held in Connection With Serious Fire at Port Colborne.

Colborne, April 27.—Leslie Burk was today committed for trial on a charge of arson in connection with the recent fire in the Express printing office. He will appear for election next week, and in case he elects for trial by jury, the case will be tried at the June assizes.

Burk was found apparently secure by bound in the office of the Express Company the morning of April 17, while the flames were raging around him. He explained that he had been knocked down, bound and gagged by a burglar whom he had interrupted in the act of robbing the Express office. The robber, he said, had escaped after firing the buildings. Four business firms were burned out by the fire before it was subdued.

FORESTS ON FIRE.

North Adams, Mass., April 27.—Blazing forest fires, which already have devastated more than 5,000 acres of timber land in the towns of Clarkburg and Williamstown, and in the outskirts of North Adams, kept more than 400 fire-fighters busy tonight. While the flames showed little signs of dying out, despite the three days' fight against them, actual danger to settlements was still remote.

The situation was at its worst in Clarkburg, where the outlying houses were a mile and a half from the front of the advancing fires, but the wind was light, and no fear was felt for the immediate safety of the farm buildings.

CLAIM CONTRACTORS ROB THE LABORERS

Serious Charges Made Against Builders of New Trans-continental Line.

Port Arthur, April 27. That the laborers on construction work on the N. T. R. are victimized systematically on a wholesale scale and that there is absolutely no means of redress under existing laws are the allegations made by Harriette A. Cole, in a statement to the press today, which, she says, he issues because he has nothing more to do for the unfortunate men than thus bringing their cases to the attention of the public.

Mr. Cole instances the cases of men who were hired to go to work in North Nipigon last fall at \$2.50 per day. When they got there they were induced by contractors to take a sub-contract, but when the spring arrived they found that by the terms which they had in their ignorance agreed to they not only had nothing coming for their work, but were \$1.25 in debt for supplies provided by the contractors.

MR. FIELDING HONORED

Degree of LL.D. Conferred Upon Him By Dalhousie University.

Halifax, April 27.—At the convocation held in Dalhousie University today honorary degrees of LL.D. were conferred upon Hon. W. S. Fielding and E. L. Newcombe, deputy minister of justice. Mr. Fielding was unable to attend. The degrees were conferred by President John Forrest, D.D., and it was his last official act, as he recently tendered his resignation as president of the college.

HOG CHOLERA

A Serious Outbreak of Dread Disease Reported in Essex.

Windsor, April 28.—A serious outbreak of hog cholera has occurred in Essex County, and a number of animals have already died. The authorities in an effort to stamp it out. A thorough investigation is being made by Dr. Hilton, of Ottawa, inspector for the Dominion Government. The carcasses of all the hogs killed are being burned. A number of cases were reported by Dr. W. B. Edwards of Windsor, who is the first time the dread disease has made its appearance in this district for a long time, and every effort is being made to prevent its spread.

TENNIS CLUB MEETING.

A meeting of the L. C. L. Tennis Club was held at the "Collegiate" after a week on Thursday, and the following officers were elected: President, Mr. Cameron; vice-president, Miss H. Woolley; secretary-treasurer, G. E. Scott; girls' representative, Miss E. Woolley; and boys' representative, H. McDougall. Provision was made for the securing of new nets, and from the number out, the club promises great success.

FLYNN RESIGNS.

New York, April 27.—Wm. J. Flynn, head of the United States secret service here, who as second deputy police commissioner has directed the recent raids against gambling houses, has resigned. Constant friction in his department and interference with his plans by those higher in authority are assigned as the reasons for Flynn's resignation.

In confirming the report, Mr. Flynn said: "My resignation has been in for some time. I shall return to the federal service. Further than this I do not care to say anything, and I would not say that much had not the information leaked out somewhere."

NEW ARMORIES AT GUELPH.

Guelph, April 27.—At a big gathering held here last night Guelph's splendid new \$220,000 armories were formally opened by Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia. The important announcement was made by Hugh Guthrie, M. P., that a city regiment, to be made up of eight companies, will be organized here. At present, owing to lack of officers, there are only four companies. The increase in the strength will be made as soon as possible.

BLACK HAND BOMB.

Chicago, Ill., April 27.—A dynamite bomb was exploded in the doorway of the Oak Savings Bank, owned by John Devoney, an Italian, at 946 Wells street, early today, tearing a hole in the iron-plated door, breaking all the windows in the four-story building, and throwing the occupants of the upper stories out of their beds. Devoney told the police that he had received several threatening letters recently, and the bomb is believed to have been thrown by the "Black Hand."
