

A NEW SCHOOL OR AN ADDITION

Board of Education Will Further
Consider the Aberdeen
Matter.

A MATTER OF MONEY

Some of the Trustees Do Not Like
the Idea of Spending \$25,000 on
an Old Structure.

A special meeting of the board of education will be held to discuss the advisability of erecting a new school to replace the Aberdeen school.

At the regular meeting of the board held Tuesday afternoon, No. 2 committee submitted a recommendation to add four rooms to the present structure, and remodel it, at an estimated cost of \$25,000. This would make an up-to-date 16-room school.

However, some of the members objected to this. Trustee Gammage did not like the idea of expending \$25,000 on an old building, and thought that the question of a new school should be carefully considered.

"That is a large sum of money to expend on an old building," he stated. "A new school would cost \$75,000, or perhaps \$90,000, and it would do for all time to come."

"Give them a new school," advocated Rev. J. G. Inkster. "I would not expend \$25,000 on an old building, and have nothing but a shell left."

"We would have a good school for 20 years or more," declared Trustee Wyckoff. "A lot of money must be expended on schools throughout the city, and we do not want to expend too much in one place."

However, Trustee Gammage's motion to send the question back to No. 2 committee to prepare a report and an estimate of the cost of a new school to be considered at a special meeting of the board, carried.

MANY ARE ON WAITING LIST

Industrial Classes In Alexandra
School Are Very Popular Now.

GOOD WORK BEING DONE

Principal Beal Presents Report to the
Board of Education Which Is Very
Satisfactory.

The report of the industrial advisory committee, presented Tuesday afternoon at the meeting of the board of education by Chairman Gammage, was most interesting, and bears testimony to the fact that the committee and Principal Beal are doing excellent service.

According to the report there were 212 applications for admission received, which were divided as follows: Men and boys, 118; women and girls, 93.

These were divided among the several subjects as follows: Men and boys—Machine shop practice, 20; forge shop, 20; woodworking, 31; mechanical and architectural drawing, 69; business English, 62; special mechanical and architectural drawing, 30; special business English, with other subjects, 10; English alone, 7.

Women and Girls—Dressmaking, 67; cooking, 25; home economics, 33; practical English, 24; special English, 1. One hundred and thirty-seven pupils have been admitted to the school—men and boys 75, women and girls 62.

The classes are taking the following classes:

Men and Boys—Machine shop practice, 20; mechanical and architectural drawing, regular course, 52; forge shop, 20; woodworking, 20; mechanical and architectural drawing, special course, 14; business English, 30.

Women and Girls—Dressmaking and sewing, 40; cooking, 12; home economics, 19; practical English, 17. There is still a considerable number on the waiting list.

Owing to the number of applicants a second class in dressmaking had to be organized. Miss Carson has been placed in charge.

The sum of \$211.50 in fees has been paid into City Treasurer Bell by the students.

"I think the report is most satisfactory," said Trustee Gammage. "It makes certain the success of this branch of our work. I am well pleased."

MEAT INSPECTION

Matter Is Brought to the Attention of
the City Council by Guelph's
Mayor.

Meat inspection and public abattoirs are to the fore again, and it is probable that at the coming session of the Legislature something will be done to relieve the conditions.

Mayor Thorpe, of Guelph, has taken the matter up, and has written to the city council here asking their co-operation in having legislation passed to allow municipalities to inspect all animals before they are killed, and to provide for public abattoirs.

At the present time the health officials of the municipalities have power only to inspect meats, but have no power to look over live animals. The present inspection is looked upon as a joke.

The idea has the indorsement of the majority of the aldermen, and the finance committee will draft a suitable resolution at a meeting to be held shortly.

TELEPHONES WILL BE PLACED IN SCHOOLS

Board of Education So Decided
on Tuesday—Four Schools
Equipped.

Telephones will be placed at once in all the large public schools of the city. For some time this question has been up for discussion, but it was never settled, in spite of the demand for telephones.

At the meeting of the board of education Tuesday afternoon, No. 2 committee recommended that telephones be placed in all the large schools.

Four of them are already equipped—Simcoe street, St. George's, Victoria, and Alexandra. All the others, except Colborne street south, King street, Richmond street north and Quebec street, will have phones.

The latter are but two room schools, and it was considered that telephones were not needed there.

The trustees did not discuss the question at their meeting, the recommendation going through without a dissenting vote.

ENGAGE MALE TEACHERS FOR THE LOWER GRADES

No. 1 Committee of Board of
Education Will Consider
the Matter.

The advisability of having male teachers for Grade 6 and 7 will be considered by No. 1 committee of the board of education at an early date.

For some time leading educationists in the city have been advocating this matter. Tuesday afternoon it was brought up, and on motion of Trustee Strong was referred to No. 1 committee to consider and report on.

It is not the intention of the trustees, if the plan is adopted, to change at once, but whenever a vacancy occurs, to engage a male teacher to take the work.

"We will go into the matter thoroughly," declared Trustee Strong. "If the suggestion is valuable, we will adopt it."

In addition No. 1 committee will engage a supervisor for the kindergarten, and the domestic science departments at once.

GOES TO PORT LAMBTON

Rev. R. F. Odrowski Has Been Transferred by the Bishop.

Rev. R. F. Odrowski, of the staff of St. Peter's Cathedral, has been transferred from this city by Bishop Fallon, and will be placed in charge of the Catholic parish at Port Lambton in a short time.
