There can be no direct issue between the United States and Germany, unless Germany goes to the length of sinking merchant vessels of the United States or of taking American lives. "On land and sea alike the Russians and the British provoked hostilities," Talaat Bay declared. "Our action finally was the result of efforts to bottle up our fleet by mining the entrance to the
