

LIEUTENANT ALONE LIVES THROUGH FIRE IN AN AWFUL DASH

All of His Men Drop in Tornado of Lead.

WOUNDED ARE CHEERFUL

Pleased at Thought That Tide of Battle Has at Last Turned.

LONDON, July 4.—11:52 p.m.—Convoy of wounded continue to arrive at different ports, where everybody comments upon their cheerfulness and high spirits and their supreme confidence that the tide of battle has turned. Some tell thrilling stories. One well-known commanding officer of a battalion, who was landed at Southampton with a hole through one hand and an ugly shrapnel wound in the leg, which he received in Saturday's fighting, said: "Our fellows reached their objective. They would have got there if hell itself had to prevent it. No soldiers could have been finer than our men. The German machine guns were sweeping that portion of the front with an absolute hail of lead, but our only trouble was to prevent them from charging right into the thick of it before the chosen moment."

"The officers were splendid—all of them. Lieut. Chavener, in the teeth of a tornado of fire, dashed across our men's land at the head of his platoon. Not one got through but himself. But he found himself face to face with three Germans, whom he promptly threatened with his revolver, and made them lay down their rifles. He took them prisoner and ordered them to raise their hands. Just then he was knocked over by a shell fragment, with one of the Germans. When he recovered consciousness one of the other two Germans was handing him; the second had vanished. So Chavener thanked him and marched him back to our lines. "Our men marched onward, singing, fighting exactly as if on parade. If they had been soldiers all their lives they could not possibly have shown a finer fighting spirit. My battalion, being in one of the bad bits, suffered terribly, but those who fell fighting like heroes."

FIGHTING IN CHINA.

[Canadian Press.] Shanghai, July 5.—General Li Lieh-Chun is fighting his way along the railway from Shichow toward Canton, determined to enforce the demand of the residents of Canton that the Kuangtung Province shall be ended. He came in contact with the governor's forces at Yingtak, where a battle was fought on July 3. Li Lieh-Chun's troops, marching eastward from Kwang-Si Province, took Sam Shui on July 2.

Yingtak is about half-way from Shichow to Canton. Sam-Shui is about 30 miles west of Canton.

GOING TO JERSEY CITY

Young Soldier Reported Missing in No 3 Field Hospital in France.

FRENCH HAVE GAINED TWO MORE VILLAGES AND MOST OF THIRD

Take Over Five Hundred Prisoners at Estrees.

PARIS, July 4.—11:05 p.m.—The French have advanced south and east of Assevalles, where they have captured a wood and the village of Barleux and Belloy-en-Santerre. They have also taken the greater part of the village of Estrees, where 600 prisoners fell into their hands, according to the official communication issued tonight.

The text of the statement follows: "North of the Somme the day passed quietly in the whole section occupied by the French troops."

"South of the Somme, in spite of bad weather, which interfered with our operations, we extended our positions in the direction of the day toward the south and east. We captured woods in the neighborhood of Assevalles and the villages of Barleux and Belloy-en-Santerre, which we held in entirety. Estrees was taken into our hands with the exception of a small part, where the Germans are still resisting. In the region of Estrees alone we took 500 prisoners."

YOUNG GUELPH AVIATOR WAS KILLED IN ACTION

Lieut. Jack Simpson Met Death in Fight on Dominion Day.

[Special to The Advertiser.] GUELPH, July 4.—Guelph's first aviator, Lieut. Jack Simpson, son of the Simpson Wholesale Company, today received a cable from the British war office informing him that his son, Lieut. Jack Simpson of the Royal Aviation Corps, had been killed in action on Dominion Day. Only a day or so ago most optimistic letters were received from him. Lieut. Simpson was for several seasons the star man of the O. A. C. rugby team and excelled in everything in the line of athletics. After leaving the collegiate he entered the business firm of Simpson & Co., wholesale grocers. He was twenty-six years of age and unmarried.

Mrs. John Hasler, 73 Essex street, received a telegram today from Ottawa informing her that her husband, Pte. John Hasler, is officially reported missing since June 13. Pte. Hasler is a member of the 34th Battalion. Before enlisting he worked as a laborer in the employ of the city. His eldest son, John, is a private in the 71st Battalion. There are five smaller children, the youngest of whom is a baby a few months old.

SIR JOHN HENDRIE TO PRESENT COLORS

[Special to The Advertiser.] SIMCOE, July 4.—A few days ago the members of the local chapter of the I. O. O. F. were notified that the fine colors ordered by them for the I. O. O. F. of the 133rd Battalion would be presented by Gen. Logie some time next week. The recent orders that the battalion leave for the concentration camp in Simcoe County rendered this plan impracticable. Sir J. M. Hendrie, Ontario's lieutenant-governor, will make the presentation on Friday of this week at Exhibition Park, Simcoe. Sir John Hendrie and his aides, the members of the civilian recruiting league, the ministerial association and the senior officers of the battalion will be entertained at luncheon by the I. O. O. F. prior to the presentation. The advance party from the 133rd leaves Wednesday, about 75 men being detailed to get the area allotted to the battalion in order. The main body leaves on Saturday.

The Presbyterian Church recently presented their adherents in the 133rd with socks, and the Church of England boys are being entertained tonight by the A. Y. P. A., when a similar presentation will be made.

FOE HOODWINKED BY BRITISH STAFF AS TO OFFENSIVE

Germans Expected Attack Between Roye and Lille.

ALL BRITISH FRONT BUSY

Enemy Dare Not Transfer a Single Gun Between the Yser and Somme.

[Canadian Press.] London, July 5.—Reuter's correspondent at the press camp in France points out that not merely 20 miles of the main operations, but the whole 90 miles of the British front are bearing their full share of the fighting.

"So well does the enemy know this," says the correspondent, "that he dare not transfer a single gun or man from any part of his defensive between the Yser and the Somme to try to stem the southern push. From the day the British bombardment began the knell of German initiative was sounded."

An order issued to the German troops and found by British soldiers," continues the correspondent, "proves it was known that the British intended to deliver their attack on July 1, and it was thought that the attack would be directed between Roye and Lille."

"This supports the reports of the successful hoodwinking of the enemy by the British authorities," the correspondent adds. "The assault upon the Gommecourt salient, though unsuccessful, was one of the most brilliant feats of the entire war. No man's land here was of exceptional depth—200 yards—

and was covered by a terrific enemy barrage fire. But on the evening of the assault our men advanced through the infernal fire as coolly as though on manoeuvres, and the Germans did a gallant thing. Getting into the shrapnel-swept zone of the British artillery, and bringing machine guns with them, they played with deadly effect, even as they themselves were being mown down."

The correspondent further remarks: "One lesson of the battle which these operations accentuated is the costly task of clearing up villages after they are occupied. The enemy is always found to be so strongly entrenched in sand-bagged buildings and dugouts that it needs a lot of desperate fighting to expel him."

FINED \$300 FOR SELLING BEER WITHOUT LICENSE

Witness Has Been Charged With Perjury in Guelph Case.

[Special to The Advertiser.] GUELPH, July 4.—James Keleher was fined \$300 and costs in police court Friday, with an option of three months in jail, for selling liquor without a license last Sunday at his house on Webster street, to Frank and Harry Foster. The two Fosters were supplied with beer last Sunday in Keleher's house by a man called Towell, who lives with Keleher, and that they had paid Keleher money for the liquor. Keleher flatly denied that he had received any money from the young men. The case was continued today. Towell was called as a witness for the defence, and he denied the knowledge of the affair beyond having seen the boys on Sunday.

His story was a direct contradiction to the story which he told Chief Randall yesterday, when he claimed to have seen Keleher take money for the liquor from the young men. "Sticks" McCall, another witness for the defence, swore that the boys took the money before reaching Keleher's place on Sunday afternoon. After considering all the evidence the magistrate passed a conviction and fined MacDonald, K.C., acted for the crown. James Towell will appear Wednesday on a charge of perjury.

INFERS DOG MEAT IS BEING FED OFFICERS IN GERMAN PRISONS

Stratfordite's Letter, Cleverly Worded, Gets by Censor.

SAW BROTHER KILLED

Shell Struck Trench Where Boys Were Lying in Big Fight Recently.

[Special to The Advertiser.] STRATFORD, July 4.—That the diet of Canadian prisoners in Germany—that is the officers at least—is just plain dog meat, was the subject of a letter from Lieut. Glen N. Gordon. The letter is cleverly worded, and fooled the censor. It refers to receiving meat that was in close proximity to "Gypsy," "Tag" and "Jerry," pot dogs of former days.

Two killed, two missing and two wounded in Stratford's war toll today. The killed are Pte. Ernie Sugden and Arthur Elliott.

Was With Brother. News of the death of his son, Sugden came in a letter to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. Sugden, from another son, Pte. James Sugden, who was with his brother when he was killed.

The two brothers were in a trench, during the heavy bombardment of June 13, when a big shell struck the fellow lying next to Ernie Sugden, killing him and Pte. Ernie Sugden.

The other brother, James, was partly buried, and only escaped more serious injury by a piece of shrapnel falling from the upper part of his body.

Was With G. T. R. Arthur Elliott worked for the G. T. R. as a machinist, later going to Strathcona, Sask., where he joined the third contingent.

Edward King received a message today stating that his son, Pte. Harry King, who was with his other son, Albert, was killed, had been missing since June 13.

FORMER HOTELMAN IS HELD FOR DESERTION ON WIFE'S COMPLAINT

William Peat of Merlin Was Captured in Detroit.

[Special to The Advertiser.] CHATHAM, July 4.—William Peat, alias Harry Cook, formerly a proprietor of the Chatham Hotel, was held for desertion and non-support, has been arrested in Detroit. He will be deported by the American authorities and arraigned in the county police court.

The charge was laid by the defendant's wife some time ago, but he managed to escape to Detroit before the warrant was executed. He had been in the city for some time, but he was not arrested until he was captured in Detroit.
