

GENERAL DENISON FORMERLY SERVED ON LONDON STAFF

Famous Canadian, Now Retired, Was With R. C. R.

CHARGER STILL IN CITY

"Lady Betty" Is Link Between Barracks Here and General of South African Fame.

Brig-Gen. Septimus Denison, whose retirement from the Canadian militia with that rank, was promulgated in orders issued from Ottawa yesterday, was one of the best-known military men who ever held a command in this city. Prior to the South African war, Gen. Denison was attached to the Royal Canadian Regiment, West End Barracks, this city, and left London with the 2nd Battalion of the R. C. R. to go to South Africa, where he served with such distinction.

"Lady Betty," the famous old mount of Brig-Gen. Denison and the horse that carried him through South Africa, is still here, the pet of the local garrison and camp.

The story of "Lady Betty," as related in The Advertiser of a week ago, is in part the story of her master. Both are now on the retired list, but the war record of the general stands out unique in the annals of Canadian military history.

Gen. Denison first served in the imperial service as a lieutenant of the 4th Battalion of the Staffordshire Regiment, which he joined in 1880, after his graduation from the Royal Military College at Kingston. Eight years later he retired from the Staffordshires, with the rank of major, to join the Royal Canadian Regiment.

Gen. Denison served as an aide-de-camp to the Marquis of Aberdeen when he was governor-general of Canada. During the South African war he served on the personal staff of the field marshal, Earl Roberts, and, as has been related in The Advertiser, it was on Gen. Denison's horse, the famous "Lady Betty," that a link between London and the new brigadier-general.

For his work in South Africa, Gen. Denison was mentioned twice in dispatches and was awarded the South African medal, King's and Queen's, with four clasps.

After serving with the R. C. R. at Halifax, the general was attached to the staff of the present King, then Duke of Cornwall and York, while the royal party toured in Canada in 1901.

In 1905 he was appointed general staff officer for Western Ontario, and in 1913 was made officer commanding the 4th military district, which included the headquarters at Montreal. In January of last year he was appointed general officer commanding military district No. 2 (Toronto), and seconded for service with the expeditionary force in Belgium.

Military officers of this district, while such a large part of the general's military career was spent, speak in the highest terms of his ability as a soldier, and the presence of "Lady Betty" will always be a link between London and the new brigadier-general.

PORT STANLEY FISHING INDUSTRY IN BAD STATE

Catches So Small That Tugs May Be Sold This Fall.

Port Stanley, July 25.—The fishing industry at Port Stanley is practically dead. The tugs and nets have been tied up all summer. Two tugs left dock this week to try the fishing areas, but returned with but a few pounds of fish. The bad streak started early in the spring and has kept up ever since. Running expenses have not been met on any trip this year, and the industry is in a bad state.

SECOND CHARGE LAID AGAINST HOUSEBREAKER

Self-Confessed Thief Accused of Stealing Jewelry.

A second charge of unlawful entry and theft was laid in police court today against George Moore of Baltimore, Md., who yesterday pleaded guilty to stealing jewelry from John Willis, Carlyle Trebilcock, optician, swore to the information. Moore will appear tomorrow morning on this additional charge.

The five diamonds and society buttons found on Moore by the police, in addition to the articles of jewelry owned by Mr. Willis, have been identified by Mr. Trebilcock as his property.

His house was entered sometime early Saturday morning, as he had noticed several things displaced when he returned, but had not reported the matter to the police.

Moore, who is at present in the county jail, is it is claimed, addicted to the drug habit, and in his desire to obtain the necessary "dose," it is believed, resorted to theft to procure money with which to purchase the drug.

LONDON LIQUOR MEN ASK NO CONCESSIONS

Not Following Toronto Lead to Request Extensions.

London wholesale liquor dealers propose asking no extension of time beyond September 15 in order to dispose of the stocks they have on hand.

In Toronto applications for extensions of this line, but local dealers will make no such requests to the Government, claiming that they will arrange their stocks that they will have no trouble when prohibition comes into effect.

"We will not doubt be forced to sacrifice to a certain extent, but we intend getting rid of the largest portion of our stock before prohibition becomes effective," said one of the dealers in discussing the action contemplated by the Toronto wholesalers.

"People are not buying the hard stuff during this hot weather, and we are making provision to reduce our stock before prohibition. You might say this, though, that about the second week in September we expect the sales will reach an unprecedented figure, as many, we know, will store up an ample and sufficient supply for the long, dry spell ahead."

CITY BREVITIES

MAY CALL IT OFF.—The board of works will likely be called tonight, as Ald. Palmer and several other of the members are going to Cleveland with the board of trade.

BUILDING PERMITS.—Permits were issued by Building Inspector Piper today to Joe Wilkinson for a frame house on Victoria street, to cost \$1,200, and to John J. For a brick house on Loveless avenue, costing \$1,450.

Y. W. C. A. CLASS PICNIC.—The Y. W. C. A. Bible Class will hold a picnic to Springfield Park on Thursday afternoon. A general invitation to friends has been extended.

CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS.—Announcement has been made here of two vacancies in the civil service for which applications are called for. One is as assistant to the superintendent of series A, \$2,000 per annum. The other is for an assistant engineering chemist in the mines branch at \$1,900 per annum.

ASKING BETTER LIGHTS.—Motorists are asking that better lights be provided at street corners on the "paved auto belt line," used as turning points. A number of minor accidents and run-ins have occurred at such places, particularly where paved streets, corners and roundabouts are used.

BADLY CUT BY DRUM.—John Drown, an employee of the Hyman tannery was injured Monday when he slipped and fell against a revolving drum at the tannery. He received several severe cuts about the head, and several stitches were necessary. He was attended by Dr. W. M. Shoebottom. His injuries are not regarded as dangerous.

COMPLAIN OF DUST.—Auto tourists who have been using the country roads in the vicinity of Wexford, report an unusual amount of dust due, naturally, to the present dry spell. Although rains have been reported in practically all sections of Western Ontario, other than London, these motorists claim that the dust on some country roads is more than a foot thick.

APPEARS TOMORROW.—Arthur Drover, the former Barnardo home boy who was arrested on July 18, charged with a vicious assault on Mr. James Cushman of Melbourne, will appear before the Ontario court tomorrow afternoon for a preliminary hearing. Drover is only about fifteen years old, is alleged to have attacked Mr. Cushman, a well-known local politician, and to have been previously to the attack on Mrs. Cushman, he claimed, attempted to assault his employer's wife.

FIGHT FOR LIBERTY,
AVIATOR'S MESSAGE
DROPPED ON BERLIN

Called on Germans To Cast Off Tyranny of Military Caste.

[Canadian Press.] Paris, July 25.—Lieut. Anselma Marchal, who recently flew over Berlin, throwing out proclamations as he passed, is 33 years old. After dropping the proclamations on the German capital, the aviator continued his flight to Russian Poland where he was forced by engine trouble to land inside the Teuton lines near Chelm, and was taken prisoner by the Austrians.

Lieut. Marchal received his pilot's license in 1910. He had been employed by German firms and had made frequent trips between Berlin and Cologne so that he was well acquainted with the country over which he flew. He was in Germany when the war broke out, and he was ordered to go back to France. Some of his relatives still are in Germany.

At first the pilot was attached to the Paris aerodrome depot. Afterward he was stationed at the military camp and took part in a number of bombing raids. He received the decoration of the Legion of Honor December 21, on the day of the armistice.

"One of our senior pilots has rendered eminent services to the aviation corps, and has returned to place his services at the disposal of the country under circumstances of peculiar difficulties. He is a model pilot, cool and courageous. He has done 204 hours of flight."

The proclamation thrown on Berlin is described by French authorities as consisting of an "impartial statement of the causes of the war and the political reasons why the Entente Allies are bound to win," and concluding with these words:

"By this wholesale massacre of innocent women and children and by her brutal methods of warfare Germany has alienated the sympathies of neutrals, and the number of her enemies grows daily."

"The Allies are firmly resolved to go on until the utmost limit. You are fighting for your steel knicks, your squint eyes, your land grabbers. We are fighting for the liberty of all against the tyranny of military caste."

"We desire to punish the guilty. We wish to make restitution on present carnage impossible, and that object will be attained if in Germany the people possess the right to decide questions of war themselves."

ARMY DOCTORS OF FOE
ARE SHORT OF SUPPLIES

Expect That the Deutschland Will Carry Cargo.

[Canadian Press.] New York, July 25.—The medical staff of the German army is feeling the effect of the blockade, and is in shortage of necessary surgical supplies, according to Dr. Carl Eggers, a New York surgeon, who reached here today.

"Copenhagen aboard the steamship Dr. Eggers, who is a member of the American physicians' expedition to Germany that left here in April, the shortage, according to Dr. Eggers, consists mainly of rubber gloves, surgical outfit and plaster. The German submarine merchant fleet of the Deutschland is now in American waters, he added, is looked to as a means of relieving this shortage."

"The work of the German surgeons has been remarkable," Dr. Eggers said, "and have been but few deaths resulting from neglected wounds."

The United States and Germany are sending and some diplomatic mail.

SAYS INDICATIONS POINT TO ULTIMATE VICTORY WITHIN SHORT TIME

LOOKS LIKE BEGINNING OF
END FOR GERMANS WHO
LONDON NEWSPAPERMAN

Lieut. Joe Walters, Advertiser Reporter, Declares Officers Back From Front Are Sure of Speedy Victory, Though at Stupendous Cost of Men and Munitions of War.

Lieut. Joseph Walters, until his appointment as a platoon commander of the 31st (Bn) Battalion, a member of the editorial staff of The Advertiser, writes most interestingly of war time conditions in England following the start of the big drive. In a letter to a member of the staff he says:

"The 31st Battalion, C. E. F., is now tucked away safely 'somewhere in England' (censor forbids name of camp) and at present your staff is at short notice, along with ten other officers of the unit, finding out what we do not know about musketry."

"So far we are into point to the front as such will soon be shattered. Every Canadian battalion since the 15th has been broken up and scattered to the four winds of heaven. They are sending them over in drafts, companies at a time, to fill in gaps in battalions already cut to pieces."

Big Drive in Earnest.
"The long-talked-of 'big drive' is on in earnest. No more of your ahead ten yards and back ten yards. The Allies, according to the officers with whom I have talked on their return from months of service at the front, have at last reached the point where they can grip up their loins and smash through the Hun lines. These officers say that it will be a tough proposition and that the cost in lives and engines of war will be staggering. However, stupendous the effort those with the 'know' are confident of an ultimate victory in the near future."

Commemorate Second Anniversary of War.
The city council and other patriotic bodies in the city have unanimously passed the question of a celebration for August 4 in commemoration of the day that Britain entered the great world war.

The following proclamation issued in the Ontario Gazette of July 8 has been sent out to the various municipal bodies in Ontario and other organizations interested in the movement to fittingly mark August 4:

Proclamation.
Whereas, Friday, the 4th of August, will be the second anniversary of the declaration of war and the occasion calls for fitting recognition throughout our province;

We, therefore, believing it to be right and proper that our people should on that date reaffirm their belief in the righteousness of the cause for which we are fighting, and their inflexible determination, to continue the struggle until victory has been achieved, have thought fit to call on the people of Ontario to appoint, and do hereby appoint the said day to be observed throughout our Province of Ontario in the manner aforesaid;

And we do hereby urge the calling of public meetings throughout the province on the date mentioned for the purpose of stimulating the devotion and patriotism of our people and of embodying those sentiments in appropriate resolutions and thereby uniting them effectively for the supreme effort which is necessary to bring to a victorious issue the struggle for the maintenance of those ideals of liberty and justice which are the common and sacred cause of the Allies.

WHAT GERMANS CLAIM.
Berlin, July 25.—(Via London, 4:40 p.m.) The text of the German official statement reporting the operations on the western front says:

"North of the River Somme, after the unsuccessful British attack of July 21, the British and French forces yesterday made a resolute and combined attack on the Pozieres-Maurepas line. It again broke down either through our fire, or in some places after sharp hand-to-hand fighting."

"East of the Pozieres at Fourcaux Wood, near Longueval and near Guillemont, Brandenburg Grenadiers and three-Soyevourt regiments repeated their attempts to recapture positions on the Froide Terre Ridge, he being repulsed by our certain of fire."

VOICE OF THE
PEOPLE

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
We are greatly indebted to you for your helpful courtesy in enabling us to pass on to your readers some out of the many messages which are almost daily reaching us for our encouragement from friends and fellow-workers, who have tried and successfully tested the plan to utilize the services of women as authorized officers, under the police authorities of the cities.

With them the experimental stage has been already satisfactorily passed. With us it has yet to come. We may not have what we are asking for now, but we will not be deterred by that. It will not always be denied to the women of London we have faith enough to confidently believe.

Mr. H. H. Rose, mayor of Los Angeles, Cal., gives us his opinion. "That a woman is capable of attending to certain phases of police work with greater success in obtaining results than policemen, and that her services in connection with cases concerning women and children are such that every large city has before it the suggestion that a corps of police women be placed in charge of one or more women."

Mr. Charles E. Sebastian, chief of police of Los Angeles, Cal., writes: "I can say nothing but good of the women's work in my department. Since the first police women were appointed in Los Angeles I have urged constantly the appointment of additional women. We have three now and will have more. They are doing their experimental stage, and I would not, if I could, dispense with their services."

The same subject, thus remarks the New York Herald: "The police department, being a great peace army to prevent crime and maintain law and order, should have women members in every city. Much of the objection which exists to the effort to obtain a recognized position of police women for women on the police force of a city arises from a mistaken view that the sum and substance of a police officer's duty is to arrest offenders, who are in fact, twofold: he is a protector and guardian of the weak, a prevention of evil as well as, when obliged to be so, a punisher of law-breakers. The prevention of crime is the duty of police duty, and it is the woman's co-operation can find its best place. Faithfully yours."
