LADY AND MARION BECK RIDE IN HUNT

Innovation at New York Horse Show.

MARION'S MOUNT ACTS UP

Gotham Society Generously
Overlooks Blunder and
Applauds Splendidly.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—The first of the real novelties of the horse show came late this afternoon, when the class for hunt teams of those qualified hunters, to be shown with riders in uniform, brought two women riders into the ring. In the person of Lady Beck and her 12-year-old daughter, Marion, wearing top hats and the most becoming black costumes of the London (Canada) Hunt Club, of which Sir Adam Beck is M. E. H.

Sir Adam rode his thoroughbred, Sir Edward, which had the distinction of having won the middleweight championship at the Olympia show a few years ago from a field of about three hundred horses. Lady Beck had the mount on Sir Thomas, a son of Longfellow, and Miss Beck rode Melrose, a half-bred—all boys, which have been used on the field in the Mervin Hunt in England, as well as at the Canadian hunts.

Quite an innovation, while there was nothing novel in the appearance of hunt teams in the garden, there was in the fact that the horses were ridden over the other stiff jumps by ladies, an innovation that would likely be followed were the show held in the spring, when the Long Island hunt could be seen in the garden with their hunters.

There was a hearty reception to the ladies when they rode into the ring, and a sigh of anxiety when Miss Beck, who led the trio over the jumps, was almost thrown from her mount, which lumbered so badly at the first jump as to topple the hedge over.

Lady Beck Nervous. He gained his footing, however, in time to carry his little mistress safely over the second fence in safety. This double fault caused Lady Beck to pull up her mount a bit, so that he, too, suffered over the first jump, and refused at the third, so that he had to be taken back for another trial. After that it was clear sailing for the trio, which was rewarded for its unusual performance with rather vehement applause.

VICTIM OF PNEUMONIA

Dies After an Illness of Only a Few Days.

Mrs. Frances Durst, a talented soprano soloist of the First Methodist Church, and wife of Robert Durst, grocer, of Dundas street, died last evening at 5 o'clock of pneumonia, at her residence, 256 Dundas avenue, after an illness of less than a week.

Mrs. Durst was widely known in local social circles. She had generously lent her talent as a vocalist, prior to and since her marriage, to the cause of patriotic, charitable and religious causes. She possessed a pleasing personality and a voice of rare sweetness and sympathetic quality.

She was an enthusiastic member of the Musical Art Society recently organized by A. D. Jordan, and had attended a rehearsal just a week before her death. Mrs. Durst was the youngest daughter of the late Rev. E. Evans, D.D. She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Edward Smith of Detroit, and Mrs. George Thindall of Woodstock.

The funeral will be private from the Dundas avenue residence to Mount Pleasant Cemetery Wednesday afternoon.

Brings Message to Women From Canadians at the Front.

"Our Canadians at the Front and Their Message to You" is the suggestive title of the address which Newton W. Rowell, K.C., M. P., will deliver at a mass meeting in the First Methodist Church Thursday evening, November 16, under the auspices of the Women's Emergency Corps.

Mr. Rowell's special request, every soldier's wife, mother, sister and daughter is invited to be present Thursday evening to hear the message from the men at the front.

CAR CRASHES INTO C. P. R. FREIGHT ON RICHMOND CROSSING

Seconds Only Save Loss of
Several Lives.

SOME PASSENGERS HURT

Gates Not Down, and Oxford
Street Car Had No
Warning.

By a margin of only a few seconds a level crossing fatality was averted at 11:45 last night at the Richmond street crossing of the C. P. R., when a north-bound Oxford car struck the side of a passing freight, resulting in slight injuries to a number of the passengers.

According to the statements of passengers on the car the crossing watchman had gone west down the tracks to light a signal lamp that had gone out. During his few minutes' absence the gates were left up, and the north-bound Oxford car, traveling at a good speed, was within a few yards of the tracks when the heavy east-bound freight, which could not be seen until it had passed the corner of Hyman's tannery came into view.

Crashed Into Freight. Motorcar D. Timms made frantic efforts to stop the car, but was unable to bring it to a standstill until it had crashed into the side of the freight car next to the engine. As it was the vestibule was demolished, the door being torn off and thrown upon the depot platform. The windows in the front of the car were shattered, and flying glass was distributed throughout the car.

P. Mulhall of Pall Mall street, was cut on the back of the hand by broken glass, but did not require medical assistance.

Miss Foxworthy of Pall Mall street, fainted and was assisted to her home by other passengers.

A. E. Laddell, cigar dealer, was thrown to the floor of the car and bruised about the shoulder and wrist.

Elderly Man Stunned. An elderly man, whose name could not be ascertained, was thrown against a seat and stunned for a few minutes. The car was in charge of Conductor J. Handley.

Crossing Watchman David Matthews, according to statements made by C. P. R. officials today, had just reached the tower when the accident occurred, but he was in time to lower the gates against the car.

Local officials have ordered an investigation, and the watchman will be asked to explain why he neglected to lower the gates to protect the crossing during the time he was absent lighting the signal lamp in the yard. Had the street car been three seconds earlier the result would have been loss of life without a doubt.

WORD OF LONDONER

RESULTS IN ARREST

H. J. Hearne, Alias Mallory,
Faces Fraud Charge.

HELD IN IMPERIAL CITY

Alleged to Have Named Sir
Adam Beck as His
"Supervisor."

SARNIA, Nov. 13.—Harry J. Hearne, alias Mallory, for an alleged attempt to swindle the Watson Clothing Company of this city out of \$99, will come up for trial Tuesday morning.

He arrived in this city on Saturday. It is alleged he entered the clothing store about 1 p.m. and asked one of the proprietors to show him some clothes; that he invested in a new suit, overcoat, socks, underwear, gloves, underwear, handkerchiefs, and some food and expensive shirts, demanding the best and highest prices, his final purchase being a watch; that he asked for and received a tenized bill totalling \$95; that he gave his name as Harry J. Hearne and stated that he was under the supervision of Sir Adam Beck and came to this city to investigate the hydro work which is now being done in Sarnia.

He had received a bonus of \$500 last week of this amount, \$410, with W. J. Lashbrook of London, Ontario, exhibiting an order signed by Mr. Lashbrook guaranteeing payment of all orders issued; that he paid \$5 in cash and left the remainder for the remaining \$90, the goods to be delivered in his room in the Clair Hotel before 6 o'clock.

Reputed by 'Phone. It is also alleged that, after leaving his room, he visited a shoe store and was fitted out with a new pair of shoes, and the clothing store proprietors called Mr. Lashbrook of London on the long-distance phone and received the information that Lashbrook knew no such man, and possessed no such order, and were told to arrest the man and get the order.

The local police officer, Inspector Beattie, at 6 o'clock, and found two empty suitcases apparently waiting to be filled with his purchases, and all ready for a hasty departure. Owing to the absence from the city of Crown Attorney Wilson the accused was remanded for trial until Tuesday morning.
