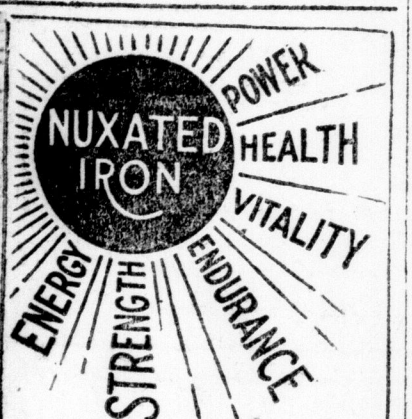

## FOUR KILLED AS TROOPS SHOOT LEXINGTON MOB

Many Injured in Attempt To  
Lynch Kentucky Murderer.

TROOPS PATROL STREETS

Recurrence of Violence Feared  
—500 Additional Soldiers  
On Way.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Feb. 9.—Martial  
law prevails here tonight. Six hundred  
federal and state troops are patrolling  
the streets and preventing further rioting  
which, during the day, exacted a toll  
of four dead and fifteen wounded.  
The city was quiet early tonight, but  
authorities fear a recurrence of vio-  
lence. Five hundred additional United  
States troops are en route from Camp  
Taylor, Kentucky.

Began in Morning.  
Rioting began this morning when a  
mob bent upon lynching William Lock-  
ett, a negro, who confessed to the mur-  
der last week of 10-year-old Geneva  
Henderson, trashed first upon with rifles  
and machine-guns by state militia men  
as the mob was storming the Fayette  
County court house to free the negro  
during his trial. The attempt to lynch  
Lockett was made just after he con-  
fessed to the murder in the first  
degree. He was sentenced to die in the  
electric chair March 11.  
Hundreds of farmers from the sur-  
rounding country arrived early to at-  
tend the trial, and the mob, which be-  
gan firing toward the courthouse be-  
cause of the state troops, when the trial  
opened the courthouse was crowded to  
the roof. Everyone was searching for  
firearms before being driven back by  
side in the street in front of the court-  
house.  
The cry "Let's get him," from a  
bravely farmer on the outskirts of the  
crowd, turned the throng into a mob  
which began surging toward the en-  
trance to the building. Soldiers and  
police dropped back into close forma-  
tion and trained their rifles on the  
mob, which never hesitated.  
Adjutant-General Dugan, in com-  
mand of the militia, ordered a final  
warning and then fired a revolver.  
The mob, which was the signal for the  
troops to fire.  
Soldiers and police fired point blank  
into the crowd and a nearby machine-  
gun rattled. From the windows of the  
courthouse above another hail of bullets  
splattered down on the asphalt street.  
Four men fell at the first volley.  
The mob, which had surged half way  
up the steps, crossed back and broke.  
Quick action on the part of the authori-  
ties got the negro out of the building.  
Lockett's arrest, indictment, trial and  
sentence sets a new record for rapidity  
in Kentucky. He was arrested last  
Tuesday night, indicted Friday and was  
tried, found guilty and sentenced in a  
few minutes today.

## NO CURTAILMENT ON PUBLIC WORKS COST DURING WAR YEARS

Millions More Spent Than in  
Peace Years.

ESTIMATES \$21,000,000

Prepared For Submission To  
Parliament For Expense  
of Fiscal Year.

(Special To The Advertiser.)  
OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—Public works  
estimates to a total of approximately  
\$21,000,000 have been prepared for sub-  
mission to Parliament, to cover ex-  
penditures for the coming fiscal year.  
These estimates include both main-  
tenance and new works, and for the  
far greater part are simply revotes of  
appropriations already approved.  
All works now in progress are to be  
continued during the war. The work  
of Courtenay Bay, St. John, the  
work of a breakwater at Port  
Arthur, a drydock at Esquimaux, and  
which is still being held up and has  
not yet been awarded, chiefly for the  
ment has been a head for some time  
back.  
Generally Supposed  
It is being generally supposed that  
public works expenditures were heavy  
during the war. A comparison, however,  
on public works under capital  
and consolidated expenditures during  
the five years from 1914-15 to 1918-19,  
inclusive, and for the five years pre-  
ceding really tells a different story.  
During the five years war a total of  
\$170,915 was expended under capital  
account, and a total of \$32,263,253  
consolidated account, or a total al-  
together of \$32,434,168. During the five  
years preceding the war a total of \$29,  
431,237 was expended on capital ac-  
count, and a total of \$55,703,133 on con-  
solidated account, a total altogether of  
\$85,134,370.  
In other words, over five millions  
more were spent during the war years  
than during the preceding five years  
of peace. Part of the increase may be  
accounted for in increasing costs of  
materials and labor, in addition to the  
new parliament buildings, which have  
already exceeded the first estimated  
cost. Estimates for the coming fiscal  
year, as has been stated above, ap-  
proximate \$21,000,000. The total ex-  
penditure under capital and consolida-  
ted account for the fiscal year 1918-19  
amounted to only \$12,650,406.

## BALLOT CALLED FOR GENERAL STRIKE IN WINNIPEG, TESTIFIES

WINNIPEG, Man., Feb. 9.—(By  
Canadian Press.)—William Percy, a  
member of the strike committee, was  
recalled to the stand today at the trial  
of the seven strike leaders, and gave  
evidence regarding a ballot on the ques-  
tion of the six-hour day and the five-  
day week and the organization of the  
One Big Union.  
The ballot, he said, was issued  
throughout Winnipeg labor unions. The  
ballot, which he identified, he said,  
called for a general strike July 1, 1919,  
to enforce its demands. A copy of the  
first issue of the One Big Union  
bulletin was also identified by Percy.  
A. J. Andrews, senior crown  
counsel, read excerpts from the bulle-  
tin, which Percy said had been dis-  
tributed at the Labor Temple on the  
first day of the general strike. Percy  
will be cross-examined by the defence  
at the afternoon session.  
Inspector Greer of the provincial  
police of Ontario, identified documents  
seized June 30 in raids at Toronto and  
Windsor. A number of Royal Northwest-  
Mounted policemen identified docu-  
ments and literature which they had  
seized at various raids throughout the  
West.

## STRIKE ORDERS OUT 300,000 ON U. S. RAILWAYS

WANT WAGE INCREASE

DETROIT, Mich., Feb. 9.—Orders di-  
recting three hundred thousand mem-  
bers of the United Brotherhood of  
Maintenance of Way Employees and  
Railway Shop Laborers to suspend  
work at 7 a.m. on Tuesday, February  
17, were sent out tonight to the various  
localities of the organization.  
Decision to order the men out was  
announced by Allan E. Barker, grand  
president of the brotherhood. The strike  
can be averted only if the federal rail-  
road administration before Saturday,  
grants wage increases demanded last  
summer. Mr. Barker said tonight.

## Buck Compulsory Training in U. S.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—Demo-  
cratic members of the House  
meeting in party caucus tonight,  
refused to forego an expression  
of their feelings on universal  
training in the face of an appeal  
from President Wilson that ac-  
tion be withheld so that the  
party's stand might be left to  
its national convention. By a  
vote of 88 to 37 the conference  
voted down a proposal by Rep-  
resentative Doremus, Michigan,  
that no action be taken on the  
question. His motion was a sub-  
stitute for one proposing that the  
Democratic members declare their  
opposition to compulsory train-  
ing.  
Immediately afterward the  
Democrats by a vote of 128 to 17  
went on record as against uni-  
versal training, adopting a resolu-  
tion declaring "it is the sense  
of this caucus that no measure  
could be passed by this congress  
providing for universal compul-  
sory military service or train-  
ing."

Shop Laborers in calling a strike of  
its membership was called by railway  
administration officials to be a viola-  
tion of the union agreement. This  
agreement was said to provide  
without a strike shall be issued  
receiving 30 days' notice. It was de-  
clared the railroad administration had  
received no official information of the  
union's grievance, and the strike call  
was set only eight days ahead.  
Director-General Hines has tele-  
graphed President Barker of the union  
for a statement as to why the strike  
was called, it was said. No reply had  
been received when railroad adminis-  
tration officers closed for the day.

ter of marine, fisheries and naval ser-  
vice, was taken seriously ill on Sunday  
with a severe cold or mild attack of in-  
fluenza. He became so ill that he had  
to take to his bed and cancel all his  
engagements during his visit here. It  
was stated that his residence this even-

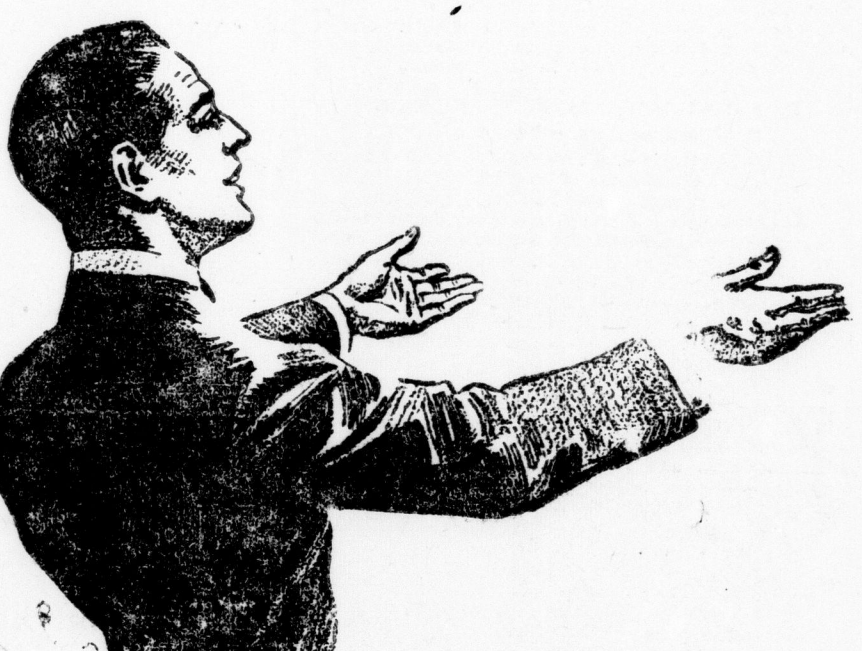
