Rev. G. Leichliter, in Sermon, Denounces Leading of Irresponsible Existence.

Points Out Necessity of Being True to Christ and Self.

Refore a large audience on Sunday Rev. G. A. Leichliter, pastor of Adelaide Street Baptist Church, addressed the congregation on the subject "Rich and Well Dressed, but Disgusted," choosing as his text Matthew xix, 22: "But when the young man heard this saying he went away sorrowful, for he had great possessions." One word rises in the midst of this peremptory demand that attracts our attention. This is one instance in which our interest shifts from the person of Jesus to the subject to whom he addresses his words," said the

"There has been a lot of sentimental "There has been a lot of sentimental speculation about this young man. Some have even contended that the Master asked too much. What more need we in this world than to live a lite of moral precision, alike satisfactory to the credal statement, church regulation and current morality. To all these this young man gave a complete and satisfying assent. To the law he turned with an adoration worthy of a noble cause. To his day and generation he appeared as a model of moral precision, and many a man would censure the Master for such an inordinate the Master for such an inordinate

"But we put sentimentalism aside and face the facts of the case. Granting his life of adherence to the law, we shall see that his piety was of an inferior grade, for when once his own sitions were pressed his piety

"You and I are forced to use our own ispositions in the light of what God spects of us. We have reduced the expects of life. Do we glorify that gift or make it paltry and mean? It depends upon the relationship to Christ in the doing of the hardest thing possible in

Let us consider this fellow who was rich, well dressed, but disgusted with the policies of life which Christ declared should bring spiritual perfec-tion. Let us consider him from the viewpoint of his real value."

Continuing, the speaker pointed out that the young man used flattery to establish himself in the good graces of the Christ, but failed to find any response from the Master. BELIEVES DESKS COST TOO MUCH

Trustee Finds Chairs For School Can Be Had For \$4.30.

Board Paid \$8.30 For Same Class of Desk in Past.

Information just to hand respecting the cost of schoolroom equip-ment would lead the average citizen to conclude, perhaps, that members of the London board of education in past years have been unnecessarily paying top-notch prices for chairs, desks and the like.

W. A. Tanner, secretary of the hoard of education, explained Mon-day that he has learned that chairs can be purchased for the South London high school for about \$4.30 each, identical with the chairs that have been in use at the London technical and art school for a considerable period, and which cost the citizens the sum of about \$8.30, including

freight from the factory. The secretary voiced the opinion that the vast difference in the price of the commodity, nearly 100 per cent, is not occasioned by any preipitate and recent drop in the cost of construction.

"The chair itself is an exact duplicate," he commented, "and I believe the former price remained as high as it was because the manufacturers did not think the same furniture could be obtained elsewhere. As a' matter of fact, the company from wnom the trustees purchased the chairs, that have been in use for a considerable period in the technical chool, have since been lowered in price.

This drop in the price followed the trustees now believe, as a natural sequence, once the company discovered, as they did themselves, that the same article could be obtained at almost half the price.

Secretary Tanner states that the more expensive chair was purchased direct from the factory, while the chairs for the South London school can be obtained through a local agent, who also must reap his commission, and placed in the school for \$4.30, all freight charges included. In addition to this, it is further stated that the latter firm is situ-

ated in a town many miles nearer this city than the former. School authorities as well as the ratepayers cannot but help feel that quite substantial profits were ac-
