VAUDEVILLE BILL AT GRAND PLEASURES

Various Performances Exceptionally Clever—Doris May Delights in Feature Picture.

To judge from the reception awarded them on Wednesday night, the vaudeville performances at the Grand Theatre for the latter part of the week attained a standard of excellence greater than usual.

Headliners were "Hooker and Davis," an exceptionally clever pair of acrobatic dancers, both with marked acrobatic ability, but each of the four ensuing acts is distinctly commendable. John Phillips, although not altogether original, succeeded in making a ludicrous act mirthful. All the delightful atmosphere of the rural community envelops "Boy Crazy," the feature picture, starring Doris May, who appears as Jackie Cameron, lively young daughter of Daddy Cameron, who conducts an old-fashioned drygoods shop in the village. Jackie likes the boys and the boys are overwhelmingly pro-Jackie.

The fun begins in earnest when a male dressmaker—a perfectly manly chap, however—comes to town and opens a de luxe establishment to which all the women of Santa Barbara flock immediately. Jackie doesn't intend to have all the business stolen from her father, so she takes charge of the situation. She opens a fashionable gents' furnishings shop and bids the whole town buy. They—the men folk—come with a rush and then the battle begins. Jackie wins, of course, but not without a lot of fun for all concerned.

Harry Myers, as the he-dressmaker, creates no end of wholesome fun. A Pathe Review and a one-reel comedy, "The Gold Bug," complete the bill.

"Tiger" Dissipates by Donning Top Hat For the First Time in Visit To America

Chicago, Nov. 30.—Georges Clemenceau, France's wartime premier, prepared to take the road again today on his self-imposed mission of winning American support for France.

The next step on his itinerary was Springfield, Ill., where he was scheduled to lay a wreath on Lincoln's tomb and deliver a brief eulogy this afternoon. He is due in St. Louis for his next big speech tomorrow.

The Tiger arose early to board his private car, which was attached to a 10 o'clock train. He did not rise as early as his customary 4 o'clock, however, for last night he dissipated, staying up until after 11.

Making his last public appearance at the opera, he disclosed for the first time in America his "mon tube"—his top hat. He had declared in New York he wouldn't wear it because his soft one felt and looked better. But, as he was dissipating, he decided to do it up brown.

Clemenceau was given a long ovation when he entered the Potter Palmer box at the end of the prologue to "The Snow Maiden." A few minutes later the curtain, rising on the set for the first act, disclosed Eduardo Coteuill, French basso, holding a big tri-color, and Cyrena Van Gordon, draped in the Stars and Stripes, with the entire company behind them.

Coteuill sang the "Marseillaise" and Van Gordon the "Star-Spangled Banner."

Before he went to bed he dictated a Thanksgiving message to America, declaring the reception he had received and the interest with which his message had been heard gave him much to be thankful for.

PROUDFOOT'S CONDITION. Toronto, Nov. 30.—The condition of Senator Proudfoot, who is lying seriously ill in Wellesley Hospital here, was reported at a late hour tonight as unchanged.

REFUSES TO GRANT MRS. SMALL \$30,000

Chief Justice Meredith Sets Aside Orders Involving \$870,000.

Toronto, Nov. 30.—An interesting discussion featured the Small estate hearing at Osgoode Hall today, when orders involving \$870,000, and a yearly allowance of \$30,000 for Mrs. Theresa Small's support and maintenance, were set aside by Chief Justice R. M. Meredith on the application of the Misses Small, sisters of A. J. Small. The orders had been made by J. A. C. Cameron, K.C., master-in-chambers, without service upon either Small's father or sisters, and the chief justice held that these orders had been made improperly. A will made in Small's own library, and signed by Mrs. Small's two sisters, was read in court; it made Mrs.

Small sole beneficiary and executrix. The chief justice suggested to Mr. Hughes, for Mrs. Small and the committee of the Small estate, that the will be proved.

Gideon Small, K.C., appeared for the Misses Small. The argument was largely between Mr. Hughes and his lordship.

Incidentally, the chief justice asked why an attempt had not been made to prove the will, and when told that the difficulty consisted in proving Small dead, he replied that the circumstances might show death.

In that event it would not be necessary to wait for seven years to elapse. The courtroom was comfortably filled during the hearing, indicating the interest taken in the case of the missing millionaire and theatre magnate.

APPOINT TORONTO MAN PROVINCIAL OFFICER

Woodstock, Nov. 30.—Another addition has been made to the staff of the provincial police in Woodstock. Today P. C. Deives of Toronto arrived, and will in the future work with the local staff.
