## **ACTION IS NEEDED** TO REDUCE RATE

Bell Points Out Rate at Present Stands at 39.25 Mills.

If Mayor Wenige expects to have a 32-mill tax rate by this time next week he will have to hurry along his ouncillors a trifle.

City Treasurer James Bell reports that the tax rate would stand in the neighborhood of 39.25 mills if all es stimates were passed as they stand now, that is including the two high schools and the one mill for the Welfare Fund Association.

There is every indication, of course that this 39.25 mark will be reduced substantially, as none of the alder men have favored the incorporation of the one mill for welfare purposes. Mayor Wenige seeks a mill rate below the 34.7 mark of 1923, and city authorities agree that this is possible if the aldermen are willing to wield the pruning knife hither and yon.




