# CLAIMS OF GLOBE

Former Acting Editor in Letter Again Attacks Attitude of Paper.

Canadian Press Desnatch. Toronto, Sept. 1.-The Globe tomorrow will publish the following letter from John Lewis, former act-

ng editor: "To the Editor of the Globe:

"In your editorial of today you very properly uphold the right of the Globe to express disagreement with the Liberal government or the Liberal party on a question of principle. But this is not the point. I am familiar with the career of the Hon. George Brown, whom you quoted. I can imagine him disagreeing with the Hon. Alexander MacKenzie as the Hon, Alexander MacKenzie as leader of the Liberal party, and speaking out frankly, but I cannot imagine his issuing an order that the Globe must never say a word in favor of MacKenzie or his government of the Liberal party, or a word in criticism of Sir John Macdonald. I cannot imagine him in a general election remaining neutral as between the two parties or vaguely telling the electors to vote for Liberal prin-

"In a general election that is not enough. A choice must be made be-tween men. Mr. Brown and his suc-cessors realized this. No matter how frankly they have disagreed with how frankly they have disagreed with or criticized. Liberal governments, they never hesitated in a general election to say what public men and what party ought to be entrusted with the task of governing the country. And they never, until the election of 1917, nesitated to make their choice for the Liberal party. In 1917 the Globe supported union government under peculiar circumstances such as do not now exist.

under peculiar circumstances such as do not now exist.

"In the next general election the electors must decide for the King government or for a Meighen government. They cannot evade this choice by saying that they are in favor of Liberal principles.

"The Globe is dissatisfied with the King government because it did not protest with sufficient vigor against the Senate's obstruction of Liberal measures. Consider how that bears upon the general election. A vote for a Liberal candidate is a vote to bring the Senate into line with the Liberal government and the House of Commons. A vote for a Conservative candidate is a vote to bring the government and the House of Commons into line with the Senate. It is a vote, to quote your closing words, 'to surrender the direction of public affairs in Canada to a senatorial oligarchy, representative of nothing but the prejudices of superannuated politicians and the predatory instincts of high finance." "The idea that the miners cannot work unless they have a contract," he said, "is unsupported by reason or practice."




