King Edward's Doctor and Other
Eminent Physicians
Say So

LONDON, April 30.—A contradiction of the recent declaration in favor of alcohol by leading English physicians is now published by the Medical Press over the signatures of a dozen physicians, including Sir Frederick Treves, Sir James Parr and Wm. Ewert. Referring to the recent manifesto the signatories say:

"We gravely dissent from such of its teaching, nor can we accept it as an authoritative statement of recognized medical opinion on the matter."

The signatories say further that they believe that alcohol is unnecessary as an article of consumption in the case of healthy men and women, and that its general use could be discontinued without detriment to the world's welfare. Believing, they also say, that alcohol is one of the most fruitful sources of poverty, disease and crime, they are pleased to add that it is now sparingly employed as a remedy by a majority of medical men.

Sir Frederick Treves is physician to King Edward, and was not long ago knighted by the king in recognition of his services in restoring him to health just before his coronation.

SAME AS GERMANY

United States Will Grant France Equal Trade Concessions

WASHINGTON, April 30.—While the recommendation from United States ambassador White at Paris to the effect that a tariff commission be appointed by the United States to endeavor to effect an arrangement with the French government, such as was made in the case of Germany, has not yet formally come before the state department, it can be announced authoritatively that if the French government desires such a commission there will be no opposition here. Moreover as the agitation in France in connection with the American tariff seems to be based in part upon a fear that Germany will secure certain advantages over France in the matter of trade through the arrangements which were to-day acted upon favorably by the upper house in Berlin, it may also be announced that the state department is prepared to grant France any concessions made to Germany, provided the concessions are even on both sides. Thus if a twenty per cent. reduction of duties on German champagne is provided for in the pending German-American arrangement, that same privilege can be enjoyed by French champagne if the government of France is willing to make concessions to America in return similar to those made by Germany.

TOKIO IN DISORDER

Discharged Shipbuilders Make Attack on Works—Troops Called

TOKIO, April 30.—Owing to the discharge of six hundred workmen from the shipyards at Kuraga disorders have broken out there and part of the works have been destroyed. A detachment of police and eighty soldiers, sent from Yokosuka to Kuraga, have been unable to restore order and further troops have been despatched to the scene of the disturbance.

MAYOR SCHMITZ TO RESIGN NOW

"Understanding" With Prosecution
Causes Consternation
Among Grafters

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—The information the prosecution is said to have obtained from Mayor Schmitz in his offer to turn state's evidence is material in the charges of bribery against President Patrick Calhoun, of the United Railroads. Schmitz is said to have admitted that previous to the passage of the overhead trolley franchise ordinance he had a number of conversations with Calhoun and came to "an understanding" with him regarding the passage of the ordinance.

There is no intimation given that Calhoun paid Schmitz directly any money; on the contrary, this is specifically denied. The financial end of the transaction is said to have been handled entirely by Ruef.

It is expected that the formal resignation of Schmitz as mayor will soon be tendered, but this step may be deferred until the plans are made to take over the city government.

The report that Schmitz had reached an understanding with the prosecution caused great excitement in graft circles. It is expected that the fall of the mayor will bring a host of other seekers after immunity to the office of the district attorney.

Mayor Schmitz adhered to his rule refusing to discuss any matters bearing upon the graft situation. There were a number of anxious callers at his residence, among whom were many officials prominent in the city government. He did not see any of these callers and refused to answer any telephone inquiries.

Abe Ruef refused to comment upon the matter.

NATIVES IN PANIC STROMBOLI ERUPTION

Detonation Deafening—Masses
of Cinders and Ashes
Thrown Out

MESSINA, Sicily, April 30.—Some of the inhabitants of the Island of Stromboli, who have escaped from there and reached this city, describe the eruption of the Stromboli volcano as terrific. They thought the mountain was about to open and that all the people would be swallowed up or thrown into the sea. The detonations are deafening. Red, burning stones, ashes and cinders were thrown up and about a thousand feet over the top of the volcano, which is 3,000 feet above the level of the sea, an immense dark umbrella-shaped cloud formed.

The industrious population of the island, numbering about 2,000 persons, had with great efforts gradually cultivated the sides of the volcano almost up to the crater, chiefly by the plantations of vineyards, but the eruption has entirely destroyed everything within a radius of 1,500 feet of the crater, and has seriously damaged the rest of the island.

FOR FAMINE-STRICKEN

Transport Sails With 4,000,000 Pounds of Flour—Gift of Christian Herald

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—Carried into the stream by the army tug Slocum, with the 22nd infantry band playing martial airs, the crowds on the quay cheering and waving a farewell salute, the United States government transport Buford sailed to-day for Chinkiang with four million pounds of American flour on board for the famine sufferers in North-eastern China, contributed and collected through the efforts of the Christian Herald of New York.

Among the passengers were a party of thirty-three persons, including twenty-five congressmen and their wives, who are going to Honolulu on the invitation of Delegate Kala Nianiole.

THREE MEN KILLED IN C.P.R. WRECK

Engineer Fixture, Formerly of
London, Among the
Victims

FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.
TORONTO, April 30.—Three men were killed on freight run off on C. P. R. near Schreiber this morning. The dead are: Engineer Fixture, formerly of London; Fireman E. G. Veaudry, and Brakeman Vallancourt. The accident was the result of a washout.

Engineer Fixture was a nephew of Mrs. Fixture, who is in charge of the C. P. R. station at the asylum. Mrs. Fixture received notification of his death by telegram this morning.

The telegram was sent from Cartier, New Ontario, by Mrs. Fixture's son, and gave no particulars as to how the accident happened.

The deceased was a middle-aged man, and lived in Schreiber, Ontario, where he is survived by his wife.

The dead engineer's parents died some years ago, and their place has been taken to a large extent by his aunt in this city. On this account yesterday's sad message came as a crushing blow to her, and she is awaiting with great anxiety further particulars of the accident.

Besides his wife, Mr. Fixture is survived by three brothers and two sisters, as follows: John Fixture, of St. Anne de Beaupre, Quebec; James, employed on the G. T. R. at Wingham, Ont.; George, at Ottawa; Mrs. Cummings, of Boston; Mrs. Stevenson, of Ottawa.

CHARGE FORGERY

Outcome of Recent Fight for Control of
New York Life

NEW YORK, April 30.—Jacob Frank, an agent of the New York Life Insurance Company, in this city, was arrested to-day charged with forgery in the third degree in connection with the recent election of directors of the company. Frank was one of several persons summoned yesterday by Assistant Attorney Smyth to the district attorney's office to explain a number of signatures on ballots cast at the recent election. It is alleged that the signatures of the policyholders on some of these ballots were forged.

The specific case upon which Frank was arrested was the alleged forgery of the name of Erhard Gerhard, a policyholder insured by Frank's agency. It is said, however, that there are about 150 cases in all. Frank says he had permission from 50 or 60 of these policyholders to sign their names to the ballots. He also admits that he had no instructions to make use of the policyholders' names in this way, but on the contrary that such use was in violation of instructions he had received from the insurance company.

MURPHY REPENTANT

Tammany Leader Would Support Recount
Bill

NEW YORK, April 30.—Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, said to-day that the peace agreement reached yesterday between Mayor McClellan and representatives of Tammany Hall included no provision for the retirement of Police Commissioner Bingham. He said also that there was no agreement that Tammany Hall should oppose the bill for a recount of the votes in the last mayoral election in New York City.

"I stated some time ago that if I were a member of the legislature I would support the recount bill," said Mr. Murphy. "That is my position now. I have not altered it."

He declared that he did not know whether the Democratic State senators from this city will oppose or support the bill.

BUILD OWN VESSELS

Japan Denies That Battleships Will be
Built in England

TOKIO, April 30.—The minister of marine denies the report that Japan has ordered a 21,000 ton battleship in England. He said such a step would not be necessary as the works at Kure and Yokosuka were capable of constructing larger ships than the preceding two launches there, if it were considered advisable.

The torpedo boat destroyed Kuru Zuka, recently launched at Kure, the minister said, had been constructed from a special credit which was not exhausted and there were sufficient funds for the construction of several more torpedo boat destroyers, whose keels would be laid immediately. Japan has now forty-four torpedo boat destroyers.

TENNESSEE TORNADO

Buildings Unroofed in Covington; Railroad
Depot Damaged

MEMPHIS, Tenn., April 30.—A meagre report was received early to-day from Covington, Tenn., of a tornado which struck that place last night, causing considerable damage, but so far as could be ascertained, no lives were lost. Two compresses owned by the Gulf Compress Co. were unroofed and among the other buildings damaged was the Illinois Central depot.

A severe rain and electrical storm is general in this vicinity.

KEEP STANDARD OUT

Injunction Asked to Prevent Oil Company
from Doing Business in Ohio

FINDLAY, Ohio, April 30.—George H. Phelps late to-day filed a petition in the common pleas court asking that the Standard Oil Company and its subsidiary companies be enjoined from doing business in the State of Ohio.

It is understood that the independent oil producers are back of Phelps and the independents offer to furnish bond in the sum of \$100,000.

HELD FOR NEICE'S DEATH

BENNINGTON, Vt., April 30.—An inquiry into the death of Ethel Mahan, the four-year-old daughter of Jarman Mahan, who was murdered Sunday, was held to-day, and it was determined that death was caused by a cut in the throat. Alfred Mahan, the child's uncle, who is under arrest charged with the murder, denies all knowledge of the child's death.

CURZON'S COUSIN SLAIN

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 23.—News has been received here of the killing at Kemene of J. A. Pocklington. The man was found in his cabin shot through the head. He was first cousin to Lord Curzon and the Duke of Portland was his godfather.

ROLLERS ASK HELP FOR PRINCE MICHAEL

Try to Interest Congressman to
Secure His Admission
Into States

DETROIT, April 30.—Hope of ever getting Prince Michael back into the United States as leader of the Flying Rollers has not been given up by the few of the colony who are loyal to him, for John R. Swinden, one of the former mainstays of the Detroit colony, who has been in England, where he has spent much time with Michael K. Mills, has asked the influence of Congressman Edwin Denby in reversing the decision that keeps the prince out of this country.

When asked as to what action he would take in the matter, Mr. Denby said: "Of course, if Michael K. Mills' representative asks me to intercede, I shall give the matter serious consideration, just as I would for anyone else; but substantial representations will have to be made showing why Mills should be admitted, and I will have to investigate the prince's record very thoroughly before agreeing to do anything for him. So far as I know, Mills lived as a quiet and law-abiding citizen after his release from Jackson prison, which would naturally be in his favor; but I will have to satisfy myself that he is a desirable citizen and that there are good grounds for the request before any steps are taken."

The brothers says the prince is in the roller colony is gradually being adjusted, and they are working to restore their temporal affairs to the basis prevailing before the "Mother Eleanor" made her getaway. Should Swinden be successful in his mission, it is not improbable that Prince Michael will again take the colony in hand. Robert Mackay, Mother Eleanor's secretary, who suddenly left Windsor with her without bidding good-bye to the brethren, is still looked on by them as one of the strongest of the faith, who has been temporarily deceived by the wife of the woman, and his return is expected as soon as he becomes fully acquainted to the real conditions.

STEPPED IN PATH OF INCOMING TRAIN

Three Sectionmen Instantly Killed
Near Batavia, N. Y.—
Another Will Die

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 30.—An east-bound accommodation train of the New York Central, ran into a gang of section hands two miles east of Batavia to-day, killing three of them outright, fatally injuring a fourth and seriously injuring the assistant foreman, Daniel O'Leary, whose leg was later amputated at a hospital in Batavia.

The names of the victims could not be learned.

The accident took place near Godfrey's pond. The men stepped out of the way of a west-bound freight and directly in front of the passenger.

BRINGS DOWN FOUR

Wounded Man Empties Pistol at Assaultants

NEW ORLEANS, April 30.—As the result of a school celebration yesterday at Avoyelles parish, two prominent farmers of that neighborhood are dead, two more mortally injured and two others seriously wounded.

The fight resulted from a fight between two boys, W. H. Sayes stopped the fight. One of them, a son of Truman Clark told his father that Sayes had slapped him.

Clark knocked the peacekeeper down. His brother-in-law, S. T. Shannon, joined in the fight and stabbed the fallen man several times.

In spite of loss of blood Sayes managed to get to his feet and fired his pistol four times, each bullet bringing down a man.

One killed Henry O. Clark, a brother of his assailant; another, C. A. Chevalier, a looker-on, while two other bullets mortally wounded Truman Clark and Young McGann.

Having exhausted his shots, Sayes beat Shannon with the butt of his pistol, seriously injuring him.

Ogdensburg Man Tries to Light Cigar
from Arc Lamp

OGDENBURG, N. Y., April 30.—Joseph Goodson was instantly killed by an electric shock to-day while he was attempting to light a cigar from an arc lamp in the street. With several companions he was returning from a dance, when in a spirit of bravado, he lowered one of the big electric street lamps and placed his cigar against one of the carbons. He received a shock of 2,000 volts.

NEW YORK, April 30.—On application of Thomas F. Hammond, a brother, Supreme Court Justice Bischoff to-day appointed W. J. McKeen, Jr., to determine the insanity of Gustave Scholer, M.D., a commission to inquire into the mental condition of James Bartlett Hammond, the inventor of the typewriter bearing his name.

FEARED MURDER; SUICIDES

UTICA, N. Y., April 30.—Ollie Wright, of Cooperstown, 45 years old, last night quarreled with his wife and struck her on the head with some sharp instrument, making a bloody wound. She ran screaming from the house and fell senseless, but soon recovered. Wright, supposing that he had killed her, went to a barn and hung himself. His body was found to-day.

INSANE PATIENTS ESCAPE

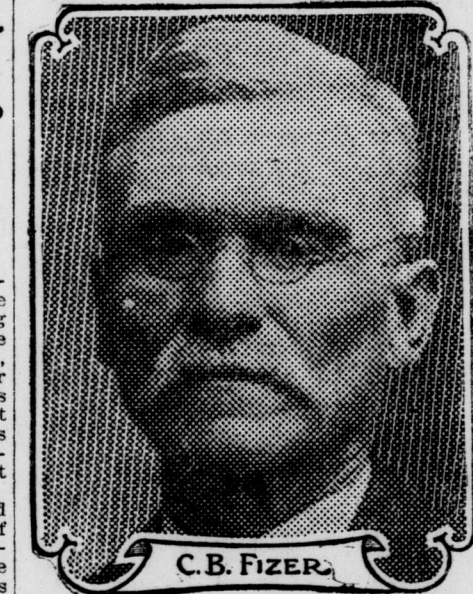
