DEATH OF A JOURNALIST .- Leonard McClure, one of the editors of the San Francisco Times, died a few minutes after 10 to-day, of Bright's disease. Mr. McClure was a native of Belfast, ireland, and brought up to the printing business. Early in life he visited Australia, and was connected with several papers in the colonies. He came to this State some six or seven years ago, and was engaged on a news. seven years ago, and was engaged on a news paper in the mining districts. He afterward went to British Columbia and published a Colonies under the Hudson Bay dictation. On his return, he was engaged as editor of the Colonist, and on the sale of that paper to the proprietors of the Victoria Chronicle, he came to this city, and a few days afterward commenced his connection with the Times, and on the retirement of Mr. Brooks and management, took charge of the paper until his illness commenced, on Sunday week. He was a writer of great elegance and considerable power. In good humored banter he was unapproachable. While in Victoria, he was returned a member of the Legislative Assembly, in the protective party's interest.
