Mr. Henry Saunders, agent for the steamer Sardonio, which has received a letter from L. L. From Granite Creek.

Contrary to the expectation of the miners, the water has not returned on other day, Mr. C. says that prospects are good, and especially on the Tulummen. The Homestead company, fifteen miles above Granite Creek, about three weeks ago took out \$200 for three days' work. Ground above this point has been staked off, but is not as yet worked.

In Collins' gulch, the day before Mr. C. left, one claim had taken out \$80 for three days' work. The other creeks pay well. In spite of the scarcity of money, the only gold being small quantities brought in by prospectors, the feeling is that the mines will turn out well, though there are many who are skeptical in this regard.

GENTLEMEN:—In obedience to your commands I have during the last few days inspected your works and made myself tolerably well acquainted with their details with a view to suggest a solution of their usefulness.

CONSERVATION.
