p. \$50,000 For Hatcheries

Fifty thousand dollars will be asked by the state of Washington from the federal congress for the construction of fish hatcheries next year in this state. He paid \$200 for a portain of Queen Victoria, and under the Spiritualists' direction framed it in fruits. He bought diamond rings and expensive furniture, some of which has disappeared, But up to the last he has not reached the stage of perfection that would enable him to talk with his wife.
