HAMAR GREENWOOD'S STATEMENT

Continuing Mr. Greenwood stated that he considered the present imperial conference a distinct step in advance in the cause of imperial unity.

When Mr. Greenwood was asked if he was the first conference, he said, "that really entered into the life of the British people and the formation of a distinct secretariat for this and succeeding conferences was endorsed by the three kingdoms."
