Local Capital Forms Brick Company for Prince Rupert—Appointments

(From Saturday's Daily)
Among the announcements in the current issue of the British Columbia Gazette is that the Prince Rupert Brick Company, which is incorporated with a capital of \$50,000. This is largely a Victoria concern of which Knox Courtney, the local barrister, is one of the incorporators and moving spirits. The company has acquired some deposits of good brick clay in the vicinity of Prince Rupert and expects to be in a position to turn out brick of all kinds before the fall is over.

The Prince Rupert Club, limited, is also among the new incorporations. The capital is \$25,000 and from the articles of incorporation it is evident that the men of Prince Rupert intend shortly to enjoy all the comforts of clubdom.

Among the other new incorporations are the Sonoma Water company, limited, with a capital of \$75,000. Its main objects are the constructing of a waterworks system in the district of Alberni.

The North Vancouver Brewing company, limited, has been formed with a capital of \$50,000.

The Rainbow Ranch, limited, is incorporated to take over the business in Yale with a capital of \$100,000.

The Review Publishing company, limited, is given authority to carry on a publishing business. It is understood that this company has secured an interest in Westward Ho, the magazine, which, however, will be continued under the same management.

The Crown Lumber company, limited, is formed with a capital of \$150,000 with authority to construct and operate sawmills, planing mills, pulp mills, flour mills and almost every other conceivable kind of mill.

The Gold Lumber company, with a capital of \$50,000, is given similar powers.

The Grand Forks Fruit and Nursery company, limited, is granted authority to carry on a jam making and fruit canning business in addition to that of a general business.

The Terminal Steam Navigation company, limited, incorporated with a capital of \$500,000 to take over the business of the Terminal Steamship company, limited. Harvey, McCarter and Macdonald, are solicitors for the new company.

Among the appointments gazetted is that of Clifford Jenkinson, of Victoria, to be a clerk in the audit office of J. D. Wells resigned. Mark Bate, of the city of Vancouver, is appointed district registrar of the supreme court for the Nanaimo judicial district in the place of Mark Bate, while Marshall Brown, J. P., has been appointed judicial administrator for the county of Nanaimo, vice Frederick L. Leighton resigned.

BROKEN AXLE DITCHES CROWDED STREET CAR

Passengers Are Given Severe Shaking Up and Two Are Badly Bruised

By the breaking of the front axle while the car was proceeding at a rate of about ten miles an hour the passengers on a Willow car No. 25, were given a severe shaking up last evening at 7:15 o'clock and two of them, Thomas Harmon and Mrs. Gilchrist were so badly shaken that they were taken to the Jubilee Hospital. The accident occurred just as the car was approaching Richmond Street, the first intimation the passengers had that something was wrong was the noise of the breaking axle, two sharp reports, followed immediately by the swaying of the car as it left the rails and ploughed across the roadway. There were fifteen passengers in the car at the time and as the car left the rails and lurched over they were thrown out of their seats. Mr. Harmon, who is of advanced years, was apparently thrown against the side of the car, his head coming in contact with the edge of a window, and he was rendered unconscious. Mrs. Gilchrist was thrown against the end of a seat and her back was bruised. Inquiries made at the hospital at a late hour last night elicited the information that while pretty badly shaken neither are seriously injured, though in the case of Mr. Harmon, his advanced age and the severe shaking up received will confine him to his bed for some time.

When the axle broke, the ends buckled up and forced up the trap doors in the floor, and as the car bumped over the road it was with difficulty that some of the passengers saved themselves from falling through the trap door. Several of the passengers received bruises, but it is remarkable that no one was seriously injured.

The car, which was an old one, having been formerly in commission in Vancouver, was not badly smashed, the only damage being done to the axle, which was broken in two places.

IROQUOIS CAME IN PLACE OF CHIPPEWA

Princess Victoria Continues to Carry More Passengers Than Opposition Vessel

The steamer Princess Victoria brought over 700 passengers yesterday from Seattle and the steamer Iroquois, which took the place of the Chippewa for one trip, brought 225. Since the fares on the big and fast C. C. steamer were reduced to 25 cents the travel on the opposition steamer has fallen off considerably. The Chippewa on Thursday, her usual lay-over day, took the place of the steamer Whatcom on the Strait route, the steamer having broken down. The Whatcom struck a submerged log and broke a blade from her propeller. She was placed on the Moresby dock at Seattle and her run was temporarily occupied by the steamer Chippewa.

URGES CITY TO ENTER INTO AN AGREEMENT

Oak Bay Reeve Again Presses Claims of Municipality on Water Question

Reeve Oliver, of the municipality of Oak Bay, has again written the city council urging upon them the claims of the municipality in the matter of a water supply. At a recent meeting of the council the request of the municipality was considered and some of the aldermen appeared adverse to the city entering into any agreement with the municipality on the grounds that while the city has not an adequate supply of water for its own use it could hardly be expected to enter into an agreement to supply what it does not possess. It was decided, however, to have the city solicitor draft an agreement which will be considered by the council. This draft agreement has been prepared. Reeve Oliver is urging the city to enter into an agreement with the Oak Bay municipality written as follows:

To the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, Corporation of the City of Victoria, Gentlemen.—If the Council report of a meeting of the council held on the 9th of July is correct, some of the members of your council still seem under a misapprehension as to the request of the Oak Bay municipality.

We do not ask you to agree to give us anything you have not yet got. We do not ask you to give us a plentiful supply when the city's supply is insufficient, nor a cheap supply when the city's is dear. We only ask you to put us as nearly as possible on the same basis as to supply as residents in the city.

If the city has a poor supply then let us have at least our proportionate share of much poor supply without making it any poorer and if the city has a dear supply let us have a share of such dear supply without making it any dearer. And if you happen in time to procure a good and cheap supply let us participate in your good fortune.

One of your councillors suggests "there must be something" behind all this hurry.

Ever since I took up my residence in Oak Bay about seven years ago, and I know not how long before, there has been a question of the city's agreeing to what I am now asking for.

There must surely be something peculiar in the water question when in these circumstances a councillor can feel that I am urging him to indecent haste.

The old Victoria suspicion that "there is something behind" our request is not more reasonable than the charge of hurry.

If you ask me these are nothing "behind" our request except a universal desire on the part of residents and owners of land in Oak Bay to be assured that they will have a share in the possibility of doubt that they may rely on having their homes connected with a water works system.

It was not until the agreement, which I understand was put in the hands of the solicitor to draft, he dealt with the circumstances as a councillor can conveniently do so.

CARIBOO WILL ARRIVE HERE ON MONDAY

The steamer Cariboo, built by the Allis shipyards at Ayr, Scotland, for the Union Steamship company, of Vancouver, for use in the Victoria-Prince Rupert service, which will become a semi-weekly instead of weekly service, arrived at San Francisco on Thursday and left the same evening for Victoria, after being coaled. She is due here on Monday. The Cariboo, which is similar in construction to the company's steamer Camosun, was brought out in 88 days to San Francisco by Capt. Polkinghorne. Calls were made at Barry, on April 23; Montevideo on May 28; and Coroneal on June 7 for bunker coal. Capt. Polkinghorne brought out the steamer Kingsfisher and other vessels to Vancouver. Capt. Moody is to be given command of the new steamer by the Union Steamship company on arrival at Vancouver. With the new steamer the Union company's fleet now totals six steamers. Another new steamer, which it was announced some months ago was to be used on the West coast of Vancouver Island. The Chilcotin will also be added to the fleet.

ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF EMBEZZLEMENT

S. G. Henderson Was Formerly in Business in Victoria

The San Francisco Examiner of Wednesday says: "S. G. Henderson, a real estate dealer, formerly associated with Crown & Lewis, was arrested in Oakland last night on a complaint for felony embezzlement against him. Mrs. Lucy D. Allison, who claims that Henderson has fled her of \$1,200. The specific charge of embezzlement set out in the complaint is that about a year ago Mrs. Allison gave Henderson \$800 with which to make a payment on a job, but instead of doing so Henderson appropriated the money to his own use. Mrs. Allison also claims that at different times she has advanced money to Henderson in real estate deals to the amount of \$1,000, but such sums were never expended in the direction for which they were intended."

S. G. Henderson was a former resident of Victoria. He was employed by B. Williams & Co. for some time and left that firm to engage in business. He rented the premises now occupied by the Dominion Express and Broughton street, and furnished the place elaborately to start business as the Semi-Ready Clothing company. He borrowed money in various quarters and secured a stock. The premises were never opened. Before the time came for the Grand Opening Mr. Henderson left the city, and Mr. Siddall took over the stock and fittings on behalf of creditors, these being sold by auction to the highest bidder.

Leaving here Mr. Henderson went to Oakland, where he has lived since, engaged in the real estate business.

GROWING NEEDS OF THE COAST MISSION

Medical Work Entails Heavy Expense—Funds Are Needed

The committee which is charged with the oversight of the Columbia Coast Mission held a long and earnest conference on Thursday last in the schoolroom of Christ Church in Vancouver, being in session from 12:30 to 12:30 o'clock, and from 1:30 to 2:30 o'clock.

The importance of the hospital and missionary work which is carried on by this mission under the capable management of the Rev. John Antle, has never been undervalued, but, nevertheless, some of the friends are of the opinion that the magnitude of the field which is not included in the work and the serious demands which must in consequence be made upon the active sympathies and the financial resources of the mission, deeply regret to see its usefulness in any way shortened, have not, as yet, been adequately realized.

It is perhaps not at all under the mark to say that if the plans which are now outlined are properly carried out, the yearly expenses will quite equal, or at any events very nearly approach the figure of something like \$10,000 a year.

A new and thoroughly up-to-date hospital building, required, and its cost is placed at \$15,000, while it is further proposed to establish a hospital at Alert Bay, and it is estimated that this proposition will entail an expenditure of \$5,000. Then, in addition to all this, an emergency hospital is to be placed at Campbell River, where the International Lumber Company is operating large saw mills, and although these mills are not at the moment fully occupied in common with other similar establishments, in consequence of the prevailing business depression, the nevertheless the demand for lumber is reviving, and within a few months a very large number of men will be again employed at that place.

Subscriptions are said to be coming in very well, but as the amount which must be secured is so considerable extensions in the work which are at the present time meditated, are authorized, those who have taken an interest in the work should not relax their efforts. A grant is also expected from the recent national thank-offering which was presented at St. Paul's Cathedral, but even then the circumstances are such as to render it difficult to secure the necessary funds.

Two hospitals are now maintained at the expense of the fund, as well as several physicians and nurses, while provisions, hospital supplies, etc., necessitate in themselves a large outlay. VARIED RESOURCES OF THE NORTHERN LANDS

Alfred C. Garde Speaks of the Riches of Queen Charlotte Islands

(From Saturday's Daily)

Alfred C. Garde, one of the best known mining men in the province and formerly general manager of the famous Payne mine in the Slokan is one of those who have a firm belief in the future of the Queen Charlotte islands and northern British Columbia generally. Mr. Garde at present has his headquarters at Prince Rupert, and has recently made an examination of the budding mining camps of those islands. He has taken some options on mining properties there on behalf of eastern capitalists which he represents, and expects ere long to take an active share in the development of the district.

Speaking of the islands at the Empire survey, he said:

"The islands of the Queen Charlotte group have great and varied resources though at present these have not been developed to any extent. So far mining work is chiefly confined to Moresby Island although Graham Island has some great natural wealth of other kinds. On the latter, agriculture is sure to produce a great deal of wealth, for not only is the soil fertile and the climate equable (the rainfall, I should think, is about half what it is on the mainland) but its proximity to Prince Rupert, with the inexhaustible market which that city will offer when it begins to attain its growth, makes the island of great importance. Then Graham Island has also great timber wealth. There is an immense quantity of aspen timber as can be found on the Pacific coast. Coal, too, is known to exist in large quantities and this is bound to mean much for the future of the islands, and there are also good oil indications. There are several companies now preparing to take place here, as well as putting a number in the classes specified in these columns yesterday. Also Mr. Wheatcroft states that he is establishing a modern sawmill on the island mentioned, and that the horses that he has now in British Columbia will, in all probability, be kept in this province instead of being sent to his farm in Kentucky, as was first intended."
