### WILL GIVE CHIEF ANOTHER CHANCE

Police Committee Said to Favor This Course and Will so Report.

The Graphic learns from a reliable source that the Police Committee at a recent meeting after taking into consideration many circumstances in connection with the case, have decided to give Chief of Police Robert Crawford another chance, with the distinct understanding that he perform his duty without fear or favor to any. For some time the liquor license act has been flagrantly violated, but no check was put on the sale of liquor by unlicensed places. This the committee want stamped out and the Graphic understands that the Chief has been given instructions to get busy and see that the law is obeyed.

Following these instructions a number of cases have been entered against violators, and these will be tried in a few days.

In the meantime the Chief is still under suspension as the Police Committee will first have to report to Council before any steps can be taken for his reinstatement.

Perhaps this will be a lesson to Mr. Crawford and in future the Graphic hopes that he will attend strictly to his duties.

### ELECTRIC ENGINE PULLS FOUR STEAMERS

In a tug of war between 1898 and 1899 of the new electric engine to be used by the Pennsylvania road in the tunnel under the Hudson river at New York, and a giant freight engine, the latter would be dragged along like a tin can on a dog's tail.

Each on another giant steam engine and 1898 would walk off with them both at the rate of 60 miles an hour. Based on a third steam engine of the heaviest type. The huge electric engine would outpull the trio. It has the power of 4000 horses. It weighs 230000 pounds. It can pull a loaded freight train, two miles long, at the rate of 70 miles an hour. It can snap an ordinary train of 40 cars into the air like a whip lash.

Its driving wheels are five feet eight inches high and it has eight of them. The engine is made up of two sections and may be run in either direction. Twenty four of these engines which were devised by the Pennsylvania road and the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Co. will haul 1000 trains daily under the river into the heart of New York City.

The operating lever is so small that the engineer with his forefinger can turn on the power of 1000 tractors. In a collision the engine will withstand an impact equal to 600,000 lbs.
