THE ATTACK ON MR. SHERATON.

If the antagonism aroused by Mr. Sheraton's address at the recent opening of Wy-

cliff hall by any measure of the importance of the occasion, then undoubtedly he has hit the mark. He is fiercely attacked, and for what? For saying, in effect, that the anglican church is and should be a protestant church.
