North Waterloo Protested

Papers Were Filed at 11 a.m. To-day For the past few days it has been rumored in political circles that a protest would be entered against Dr. Lackner's return in the North Waterloo election on Jim Vance who will be remembered as having been contested with the by-election of 1899 here when Vance lost and he said that a protest would be lodged. This was done at 11 a.m. today, with Local Registrar, Mr. John McDougall, by J. A. Seelha, of Seelha and Warr. The charges are the general sweeping ones, no particular act of alleged irregularity being pointed out. The petitioners are Fred Babatage, farmer, Berlin; Martin E. Ehr, Merchant, Berlin; and Alphonse Crossman, Waterloo Township. The official declaration of the election returns were not filed with the Clerk in Chambers at Toronto until June 17th. The persons protesting have four days time in which to make the deposit of \$1,000 into Court.

Lions and other cat animals, from the very fact that they are treacherous by nature and fierce by instinct, are the most dangerous pupils to instruct, and the work of perfecting them is a hard one, before they can be exhibited in public, sometimes lasts for months. A TRAVELLER'S TALES

Mr. Chas. Peppier, whom we mentioned in these columns a day or two ago as having just returned from a 16 months' cruise on the U. S. training ship Dixie, has some interesting experiences to relate. During the journey he touched at the following places—Southampton, Antwerp, London, France, Naples, Smyrna, Candy and Madeira Islands, Palermo, Algiers, Gibraltar, Havana, Montevideo and Rio Janeiro in South America, and other points in the West Indies. He witnessed a brief fight at Lisbon in which a man was fatally injured. The tragedy drew forth applause from the assembled multitude. On May 10th last, his ship left New York with 3,000 tons of stores for the sufferers at St. Pierre and Martinique. They were not permitted to go closer than 2 1/2 miles from St. Pierre where only a few walls could be seen standing. Their ship had a magazine on board which made the danger doubly great when in close proximity to the fiery monster. The mountain looked white probably from the ashes that covered it.
