The entire herd will then be driven across the country into the Saskatchewan valley, somewhere west of Winnipeg, where the Canada Government has permitted Mr. Cochrane to locate 100,000 acres of land. This will be the largest stock farm in the world, and the Chinook winds are said to enable cattle to winter very nicely in that region. About \$800,000 altogether will be invested in the enterprise, and the reputation of the men interested in it give every assurance of success. The North West is destined to be a favored spot when, in the pursuance of such enterprises, such men select it as the best point for the investment of capital. — Ex.
